CITY OF DUBLIN.

AT a very respectable Meeting of Freemen and
Freeholders of the CITY OF DUBLIN, con-
vened by public notice from the High Sheriffs of the
said City, for the purpose of taking into considera-
tion the Question of a Legislative Union between
Great Britain and Ireland, held at the Session-house
the 10th January, 1799.

The HIGH SHERIFFS, in the Chair.

The following Resolutions were unanimously
agreed to;—

Resolved, That as the Commerce and Constitu-
tion of this country have been acquired by an Irish
Parliament, by an Irish Parliament alone can they
effectually be protected.

Resolved, That firmly attached to his Majesty's
Person and Government, and perfectly convinced
that the present state of British Connexion has pro-
moted the prosperity of the Empire, we deprecate
an Incorporate Legislative Union with England, as
highly prejudicial to our mutual interests, tending
to alienate the affections of the people from the
sister kingdom, and to lay the foundation of incur-
able jealousies between the two kingdoms.

Resolved, That an Incorporating Legislative
Union, which would extinguish our own Parlia-
ment, and would send a few Irish Members to the
British Senate, would change the free Constitution
of this Country into an arbitrary Government, as
it would submit the Irish Nation to the dominion
of a power, over which it could have no controul.

Resolved, That the House of Commons are the
Trustees, not the Masters of the People; that the
Constitution should guide and limit the conduct of
Parliament, as the law does the conduct of the
Judges of the land; and that the Legislature is not
competent to alter, much less to subvert the pre-
sent form of our Government.

Resolved, That we invite and conjure our bre-
thren, of all religious persuasions, to concur with
us in every constitutional effort, to preserve our
Commerce, and assert our Independence.—In a
word, we trust in God! that on the approaching
and most momentous crisis, the Parliament will re-
member that they are the organ of the People, to
guard the Constitution, and to announce their will,
and that the People of Ireland shall not be reduced
to the sad necessity of recurring to first principles
to assert their unalienable rights, which can alone
be necessary when confidence may have been abu-
sed, and their rights betrayed.

Resolved, That whoever shall propose a measure,
having for its basis the extinction of the Indepen-
dent Parliament of this Kingdom, we consider an
enemy to Ireland, to British Connexion, and to that
Constitution we are sworn to maintain.

Resolved, That these Resolutions be forthwith
transmitted to our worthy Representatives in Par-
liament; and we make no doubt they will steadily
resist a measure, which, in our opinion, the Leg-
islature is incompetent to enact.

The High Sheriffs having left the Chair, and Al-
derman Henry Hutton being called thereto,

Resolved unanimously, That the Thanks of this
Meeting be presented to our worthy High Sheriffs,
for their readiness in convening a Meeting of the
Freemen and Freeholders of this City, and for
their very proper conduct in the Chair.

Resolved, That the High Sheriffs be requested to
sign the Resolutions this day unanimously agreed
to, on behalf of the Freemen and Freeholders of the
City, and to have the same published in the
Irish and English Newspapers.

The High Sheriffs having resumed the Chair.

Resolved, That a copy of the above Resolutions
be presented to our worthy Representatives in Par-
liament, and accordingly a Committee was ap-
pointed to wait on them for that purpose.
