

length agreed to without a division; the House however is to be called over on Monday the 11th, and circular letters in the mean time to be written by the Speaker to the several Members;—To remove all apprehensions of a hasty introduction of the measure of a Union, Lord Castlereagh explicitly declared, that he never would bring forward the measure without previously giving the fullest and fairest notice of it.—In the course of that night's proceedings, Colonel Wolfe, H. V. Brooke, Esq; and Sir Thomas Fetherstone, Bart. who were not present on the former Debates, took occasion to declare themselves decidedly adverse to the Union.

On Monday, in the Lords, the Lord Chancellor presented a bill for the purpose of obliging private Banks, after the passing of the act, to give cash for their guinea notes when demanded, and for those of five guineas in the same way after the first of May. The bill was read a first time, and ordered to be printed, after which their Lordships adjourned to Thursday next.

The Governors and Directors of the Bank of Ireland having represented a wish to be permitted to commence paying in specie on the first of next month, such of their notes as have been offered for sums under five pounds, and dated prior to the first of October last, the Lord Lieutenant and Council have accordingly, in virtue of the authority given by the act which passed in 1797, directed that the restrictions shall cease so far as relates to notes under the above description and date, and ordered it to be notified by proclamation.
