Mr. Alexander *locum tenens* for the Chairman of the Committee of Supplies, reported from the Committee appointed to take the supply into consideration, certain resolutions which were agreed to *nem. con.*

Ordered, That the Treasurers of the different counties, do on or before this day three weeks, return an account of the different sums paid by them on the Militia Establishment of this kingdom, for the last five years, distinguishing the respective sums, and on what account paid.

The Post-Boy from hence to Ardee and Carricmacross, was last night stopped at Loughinlea, by eight men who robbed him of the entire Mail.

The House of Lords has been chiefly occupied by an Appeal from Chancery for the last 2 days.

The rumour that Mr. Pelham had returned to this country has no foundation whatever; that Gentleman is in London, and in a very declining state of health.

A most numerous meeting of the Freeholders of the County of Tyrone, was held the 4th inst. at Omagh, at which the High Sheriff presided, when they entered into the most determined Resolutions against a Union, in which sentiments they are joined by such Counties in the North as have been convened.

LIMERICK.—FEBRUARY 13.

De Courcy O'Grady, Esq; of Kilballyowen, is appointed High Sheriff of this County.

We hear that the Munster Circuit commences at Ennis the 4th of March next;—the Assizes for this County and City the 11th, and that the Right Hon. Lords Kilwarden and Carleton, are to be the Judges.

A letter received from an Officer in the Tarbert Regiment, dated Carrick-on-Suir, Feb. 9, has the following melancholy passage.

"A Boat, in which some of our Recruits and all the Women and Children of the detachment, failed this morning from Clonmel for this town, on their way to Waterford—the boat sunk, and unfortunately six Men and 35 Women, besides Children, perished."

Saturday evening, four men who were sentenced by the Magistrates of the County of Clare, to serve His Majesty agreeable to the Insurrection Act, were brought in by a guard from the Roden Cavalry and lodged in our Gaol; and on Monday were transmitted to Cork, escorted by a guard of the Romney Cavalry.

On Monday night, a most daring murder was perpetrated in the neighbourhood of Ballyvouden, in this County, on a lad of 18 years old of the name of Dwyer, supposed to be in consequence of his having mentioned at the Fair of Kiltcealy that day, that he was acquainted with the persons concerned in the murder of the Dwyer's as mentioned in Saturday's Paper.
