

After a long debate, in which several of the Members spoke at great length, the question was put, that this bill be now read a second time, which was carried without a division.

Mr. Attorney General then proposed, in order that no pretence might obtain that the bill had not fair discussion,—was for postponing the Committee to Thursday.

Mr. Ogle was for going into the Committee immediately.—This produced a conversation of some length, which ended in appointing the Committee for four o'clock this day (Wednesday) and at 3 o'clock the House adjourned.

Tuesday, Mr. John Boyse, of Limerick, was admitted and sworn an Attorney of His Majesty's Court of Exchequer, and a Member of the Hon. Society of King's Inns.

On Sunday morning died of a lingering illness, the Right Hon. Robert Ross, one of the Commissioners of his Majesty's Revenue, and Member in Parliament for the Borough of Newry. He was for great part of his life in the military service, and had acquired no common share of reputation in the war of 1757 in America.—Col. Sparrow and Counsellor Charles Ball, are Candidates for the vacant seat of Newry.

Monday evening, at seven o'clock, the Coach of Lady Louisa Roden, was stopped near the 7th Lock of the Grand Canal, by six armed footpads, who not only rifled her person and valise of money and jewels to a considerable amount, but the fille de chambre's trunk of valuables, to amount of 1500l. Her ladyship and servant, were not otherwise ill-treated, owing to the appearance of another carriage, in which were three gentlemen, who were also despoiled by the robbers.

Kilkenny, Feb. 23. A most fortunate discovery was made here last week by the exertions of the Mayor and some other Gentlemen. Having reason to suspect that a gang of robbers was forming in the suburbs, a plan was laid for their detection, which so completely succeeded, that on Saturday night the whole, seven in number, were apprehended in the act of arranging a system of plunder, in which the mail coaches and some farmers houses in this neighbourhood were to have been the first objects. On one of them were found some arms and other articles, the plunder of Mr. Bryan's house, at Jenkinstown; and on Monday an active accomplice, whom they had detached to Waterford, was pursued by A. Fore and Robert Way, Esqrs. who apprehended him in that city, and lodged him in our city gaol. Last week two men of suspicious appearance

Yesterday was apprehended in Bruff, by that active Magistrate the Rev. J. Bennett, Jr. Carrol, alias Shane Gladdy, who stands indicted for the murder of Michael Ryan, in the year 1795:—Carrol was this day escorted to the Co. Gaol, by a party of Capt. Grady's corps of Elton cavalry.

Yesterday were brought in by a party of the Roden Fencible Cavalry, and lodged in our Gaol, in order to be transmitted to Cork for transportation, Edward Hynes, William Glynn, and Charles Connors, convicted before the Magistrates of the County of Clare, at Ennis, of being sworn United Irishmen, and for assembling on the 22d inst. with above 100 other persons, for the purpose of cutting and carrying away the carcases of 40 Bullocks and 70 Sheep, which had been houghed and killed the preceding night.

Last night, about the hour of 11 o'clock, an armed banditti, (mostly mounted on horseback,) entered the Village of Abington, in this County; they attacked the house of Edward Keys, one of the Clanwilliam Yeomen, which they burned to ashes, and wounded himself desperately in the head by a gun-shot;—they then proceeded to the house of William Keys, sen. Proctor, (and Uncle to Edward Keys,) whose house they plundered of every article—and horrid to relate, not finding his Father at home, took his Son from his bed to the door, where they shot him dead on the spot;—he has left a wife and four children, to deplore his untimely fate.
