Tuesday, March 12.

Castlereagh brought down a message
from His Excellency, acquainting the house that
His Majesty had received their late loyal address,
and was graciously pleased to express his appro-
bation of their faithful attachment to his person
and government. The message was ordered to
be read on the Journals.

A loyalist lease bill was reported.
A message from the Lords with the bounty bill,
the one barony bill, the bill for continuing the
act for the suppression of the rebellion, and the rebellion bill.
Mr. Browne moved for leave to bring in a
bill to provide for repairing cathedral churches.
The bill was given, &c.

Maxwell apologized for his non-atten-
dance yesterday, in order to the second reading
of the bill for the auditing and controul of the
public accounts. As he could not attend his place
today, the day appointed for the second
reading, from attention to his duty at the assizes,
he moved that the order for the second reading
be charged from that day, and fixed for the
15th of April next.

Mr. O'Donnell moved that the amendments of
the bill for suppressing rebellion,
should be printed.

The Attorney General opposed this on the

Mr. G. Poulsonby said, that the considera-
tion of the expence was lost in the importance of the
amendments.

The motion was agreed to, and the house ad-
journed.

It was yesterday reported, said to be on good
authority, that the Emperor of Germany had
just determined on peace with France, as
soon as the Emperor of the Empire, that in consequence there-

the guarantee of the French Republic, and that

the secret article of the treaty of Campo Formio.
