The entire number destined to go by this vessel is supposed to be 40, as so many beds, it is said, have been prepared.

Their destination is reported to be some part of Great Britain.

*Trim, March 12.* Peter Finegan, Pat. Hall, and John Fallon, were indicted, for that they on the 6th of November, 1798, broke and entered the dwelling-house of John Dixon, and feloniously took thereout one gun and 1 bayonet.

John Dixon and Richard Dixon, sons of John Dixon the elder, and owner of the house, positively swore to the fact and to the persons of the prisoners; but several witnesses proved an alibi on the part of each prisoner, and they were all acquitted.

John Kenney, was indicted for that he with others, on the 12th of September, 1798, did burglariously break and enter the dwelling house of Richard Langan, and feloniously take bank notes to the amount of three guineas, and one gun and one blunderbuss. Richard Langan the prosecutor swore, that on the 12th of Sept. last, between 7 and 8 o'clock in the evening, his house was attacked by seven armed men, five of whom entered the house, and forcibly carried away the property mentioned in the indictment, and was positive that the prisoner Kenney was one of the party. Upon his cross-examination, he said, he did not believe that the prisoner was forced there against his will, for he had a pistol in his hand, and was the first who demanded the money.—Verdict, Guilty.

Wednesday, March 13.

Peter Fox, a most notorious offender, known by the title of Captain Fox, was capitally convicted by the clearest evidence.

William Goldrick was put to the bar and arraigned upon five several indictments for burglaries and robberies. He moved to put off his trial upon an affidavit, stating that Capt. Black, of the Duke of York's Fencibles, was a material witness, and was now in England.

The Counsel for the Crown warmly opposed the motion, representing the prisoner as a most dangerous offender, who had been convicted about a year ago of robbery, before the late Prime Serjeant, sentenced to death, but from the mistaken humanity of Government, had received a free pardon, was turned loose upon the public, and in the course of one month, (January last) had committed a number of atrocious offences. It was also proposed to examine the gaoler, to shew that this prisoner had repeatedly attempted to break gaol, and had declared he would put

hanged on Saturday the 23d inst.—Dan. Fogarty, and Mich. Purcell, for a burglary and felony, to be hanged on Tuesday the 2d of April next.—John Gain, John M'Carthy, Mich. Cooke and Wm. Smithwick, convicted of the like offence—Gain and M'Carthy to be hanged on the 2d of April—Cooke and Smithwick to be hanged on the 25th of May next.—Several others were sentenced to be transported, &c.

Yesterday, the Right Hon. Lord Chief Baron Yelverton, and the Hon. Justice Chamberlain, Judges of Assize for the Leinster Circuit, set out from hence for Kilkenny.

Thursday Capt. Croker, of the Croom Cavalry and Capt. Johnston, of the Limerick Cavalry, were added to the Court Martial as mentioned in our last.

Same day, Michael Whelan was tried by the Court Martial, for seditious words, &c. sentence not yet known:—As were John O'Donnell, and John Ryan, charged with robbery; the trial of these two men, were postponed to this day, (yesterday being Good Friday, the Court did not assemble) their sentence was not divulged when this paper was put to Press, 3 o'clock.

Yesterday Wm. T. Monfell, Esq; one of the Magistrates for this County, committed a man and woman to the House of Correction for one Month, being convicted for selling Spirits without License, and being unable to pay the Fine agreeable to Law.




