and French, have been dispatched from time to
time from Hamburg to Great Britain and Ire-
land to various parts of the continent, as

formed at Hamburg Altona, and the neigh-
bouring towns, a society, called, "The Philanthropic
Society for the purpose of correspondence with
the republicans of all countries, upon a plan of
corresponding Societies established in Great
Britain and Ireland—and whose avowed object is
the ruin of all kingdoms and states. The
members of this society, who direct all
the operations of a committee of about twenty
British, French, Dutch, and Germans.
The members of the subordinate societies at
Hamburg and Altona are all under the con-
trol of the committee or principal society before
mentioned. This committee constantly corre-
sponds with Great Britain and Ireland, and all
Germany. It has secretaries skilled in
all languages—and corresponding agents
in every town, particularly London. It may
be considered a formidable engine in the hands of the
Directors, and it appears to be making
rapid progress—but there is reason to hope
that it has at length attracted the notice of the
authorities of those places."

report further states, that "Attempts are
being made, by agents from Ireland, to con-
vince the French Government the time for a

ligence has been received, that in the ports of
