Convinced that whenever the situation of our Country requires the Sword, (which is your acceptance of,) to be drawn in defence of our Gracious Sovereign, and our Glorious Constitution, it will be used with firmness and Courage;—We beg leave to assure you, bound to you as we are, by the strongest Duty and Affection, we are determined, ALL to follow, wherever you are pleased to lead.
