

MARRIED. A few days ago, John Craven Chadwick, of Ballinard, in the Co. Tipperary, Esq; to Miss Eliza Cooper, only daughter of Samuel Cooper, of the city of Cashel, Esq.

Cork, April 11. Timothy Crowley, convicted by the General Court Martial, of conspiring with others, to murder Mr. Gilman, in the neighbourhood of Dunmanway, is sentenced to transportation for life.

Yesterday died at his seat at Mitchelstown, the Right Hon. Earl of Kingston. He is succeeded in his Title and Estates by his eldest son, the Right Hon. Henry King, Lord Vis. Kingsboro'.

Waterford, April 13. Yesterday, Counsellor Sutton, Mr. John Brennan, of Castlehayes-town, near Taghmon, and Mr. Richard Hayes, shop-keeper, of Wexford, were brought prisoners in here from the latter place, where they had been tried and sentenced to transportation, for being concerned in the late rebellion.—They, along with seven others who were brought in with them, are to be sent to New Geneva this day.

We are informed three men who were implicated in the well-known horrid affair at Scullabogue, were executed at Wexford last week, pursuant to sentence by court-martial.

Thursday eleven prisoners, who were brought in here the preceding day from Limerick, were escorted to New Geneva by a detachment of Captain May's corps.

Clonmel, April 13. On Tuesday night last, a set of villains broke into the house of Robert Fennell, Esq; of Garryroan, which they plundered of cash, wearing apparel, and house-linen, to a considerable amount, and after breaking the furniture, spilling a quantity of wine, beating him and several of the family, they got clear off.

Wednesday last, information was received at Carrick, that Alldridge, Walshe, and Forestal, three desperate villains who infested a very extensive part of the Counties of Kilkenny and Waterford, to the great terror of the inhabitants, were concealed in a large wood under the house of Mr. Bolton, about four miles from Carrick, on the banks of the Suir, in the co. Waterford; a detachment of the Dorset Militia and Carrick Yeomen, under command of the Marquis of Dorchester, immediately marched for said place: on entering the wood they divided, and in a short time one of the yeomen perceived Walshe in the act of presenting a musquet at him, but which getting entangled with the boughs of a tree, afforded him an opportunity of firing before it could be disengaged; the fellow dropped, and was instantly secured, but the ball having entered under the right breast, he lived only half an hour.—He had an excellent case of pistols slung in a belt under his coat, and several ball-cartridges in his pocket.—Almost immediately after, one of the Dorset Light Company discovered Alldridge endeavouring to escape—one of them fired, but having missed him, he turned round for the purpose of returning the fire, when a second shot took him under the right eye, and killed him on the spot.—He had also a case of pistols and a musket, in very good order. We understand, in his pocket was found a paper, from which some useful information has been derived. Walshe escaped lately from the Jail of this town, where he was confined, being a principal actor in the murder of Mr. Devereux, in the County of Kilkenny. Forrestal has not yet been taken.

The Post-Boy conveying the Granard Mail in the General Post-Office, Dublin, was stopped at 12 o'clock at noon on Sunday last, one mile and Summer-Hill, by three armed men, who robbed him of the whole mail, consisting of the bags for Athboy, Castletown-Delvin, Castleward, Edgeworthstown, Granard, and Trim.

DIED. On Sunday last, at her seat at Mount Pleasant, in this County, Mrs. Rose, relict of George Rose, late of said place, Esq; she died in her 76th year, during which long period she was a real friend to the poor, and contributed largely to publick and private Charities.
