The question being put that the Bill be committed, was negatived without a division.

Tuesday, April 16.

Lord Castlereagh read to the House a message from his Excellency the Lord Lieutenant, stating his Majesty's desire, that the House would take into consideration the expediency of enabling his Majesty to grant annuities to persons who had made such discoveries to the Government relative to the late rebellious conspiracies as enabled the Government to a timely anticipation and defeat thereof, and to the prevention of the intended massacre of his Majesty's loyal subjects, and who, by such disclosure, hazarded imminent risk to their own lives, and sustained great injury in their property.

The message being again read from the Chair, it was ordered to be entered on the Journals.—Ordered also, that the Committee of Supply do it to-morrow, and take this Message into consideration.

The Right Hon. Lord Castlereagh stated to the House, that it was not the object of the Government to exceed the appropriation of 3000l. a year for this purpose.

Mr. Holmes gave notice that he would submit a motion for a bill to indemnify Magistrates who acted for the suppression of rebellion, since Nov. 1798, as the Indemnity Bill was found in many cases insufficient.

Mr. Bagwell hoped the Hon. Member would allow some previous time, in order to the due consideration of what was necessary for further indemnification, as he was aware that the measure which was to be submitted, originated in the particular case of an individual.

Mr. S. Moore said, that when the petition of the Magistrate alluded to was presented and discussed, he was absent, or he should have given it every support. He was on the Grand Jury of County Tipperary when that gentleman was publicly thanked for his extraordinary exertions; and he now expressed himself ready to support every particular or general measure, by which he might be indemnified.

Mr. O'Donnell thought the House should be cautious in preventing the ordinary course of common law, as should the people perceive such disposition in government, it would tend to alienate their affections from it, in the idea that it did not afford the usual protection for person and property. In his mind, the provisions of the indemnity Bill were entirely adequate.

The Sol. Gen. thought his Hon. Friend might be assisted by the introduction of the Bill, in order to carry out the ideas of Gentlemen.

After a short conversation, Mr. Holmes expressed his intention of delaying the Bill until Monday next.

The order of the day being read, and the House having gone into committee on the Bank and Small Notes Bill, several witnesses, pursuant to the order, attended at the bar. But no Gentleman having proceeded to their interrogation, the Committee of Ex. observed, that there was at present no understanding between the Government and the Bankers, in order to a compromise. It was highly probable, that in consequence the business would be privately adjusted. He therefore would move that the Chairman, for the present should report progress. If the parties could agree, the committee might, on a future day, report on the subject. The Chairman left the bar, and the House resumed, &c.—Adjourned.

It is credibly informed, that 10,000 men of the British Militia and Fencible Regiments are ordered for this kingdom. A like number of the Militia will, it is said, go to England.

Sutton, whose arrest at Wexford we mentioned in our last, has been honourably acquitted.

Austrian troops that were cantoned in Carinthia were marching into Friole.

Florence and Leghorn are stated to be in the hands of the French. The Grand Duke had effected his escape. Prince Maurice of Lichtenstein is stated to have been killed in the affair of the 25th, and Gen. Merfeldt to have been wounded.

The Helvetic Republic declared war against the Emperor on the 9th Germinal.

The Minister of Marine was at Brest, and had ordered all the troops to receive their arrears.

The fleet under Lord Bridport, consisting of 7 sail of the line and a frigate, sailed from Portsmouth the 13th inst.

The Boadicea, Captain Keats, has captured l'Utile, French privateer, a very fine brig of 16 guns, 8-pounders, 10 of which are brass, and 120 men, quite new, and 3 weeks from Bourdeaux.

The Post-boy conveying the Mail from Virginia to Kells, was stopped at two o'clock on Wednesday morning last, within two miles of Kells, by two armed men, who robbed him of the whole of the Mail, consisting of the Post-bags from the following towns for Dublin, viz. Ballyshannon, Ballyconnell, Belturber, Cavan, Church-Hill, Donegal, Killysandra, Kish, Lisnaskea, Narin, Rutland, and Virginia.
