MY LORD,

I Had the honour of receiving from your Lordship, during the Assizes of Clonmel, a Requisition, signed by Fifty Freeholders, calling upon me to convene a Meeting of this County, for the purpose of taking into consideration, the Measure of a Legislative Union between Great Britain and Ireland:

I have since received another Paper, deprecating in the strongest terms, the "calling together any General Meeting of the County, at such a moment as the present."—This Paper is so respectably signed, and contains amongst its signatures such a proportion of the Peerage, Magistracy, and Freehold Property of the County, as perfectly satisfies my mind, that I should not act in direct opposition to their general sense, by complying with your Lordship's Requisition.

I agree entirely in opinion with those Gentlemen, by whom this Paper is signed, that the discussion of a subject, not now before Parliament, and on which there may be a diversity of sentiment, can be productive of no other effect, than that of agitating the public mind, at a moment, when being alike threatened by foreign invasion and domestic treason, the situation of this Country too forcibly calls upon us for OTHER exertions.
