

had already been given in claimants to bring forward their demands—ample time, surely, for those who thought fit to bring them forward—and if they neglected their own interest, and did not think proper to bring forward their claims in due time, the fault was their own; but if once the House established the precedent, the House could not see where the claims would end, or what extent was to limit them.

A conversation of some length ensued, in which Mr. Beresford replied in support of this motion, and was supported by Mr. Ogle, and opposed by Mr. Prime Serjeant, and Sir Boyle Roche. The House divided on the Question—Ayes 28—Noes 34.

Mr. J. C. Beresford proposed another modification of his motion, by moving for permission to persons by name, to bring in their Claims.

The Right Hon. the Chancellor of the Exchequer said, certainly this mode was less objectionable; but then he should expect the Hon. Member would state to the House the particular merits of each person's case, that the House might see the reasons why it was to be called on to grant such an indulgence.

Mr. Beresford, said he was not prepared now, but should be to-morrow.

The Chancellor of the Exchequer was against postponing the third reading, but moved it now.

Cork, May 2. Eleven of the gang who murdered Mr. Hutchinson have been apprehended, and they acknowledge their guilt; and we hear a Father has turned approver against his Son.—There are eight more of this gang who committed a number of robberies in this county, occupying a range of country near 80 miles; and it is expected from the pursuit after them that they must be all taken.

A rumour has this day prevailed here, with some degree of credit, that the French fleet, consisting of thirteen sail of the line, had sailed from Brest on the 26th ult. Their destination is not positively known; however, we suppose it is for this country; and we have the pleasure to state, that Lord Bridport is at this moment on our coast with 16 sail of the line and 6 frigates, and will be joined immediately by the force now in this harbour, which was getting under weigh, when our messenger left Cove, at 12 o'clock this day. Should the French, in their desperation, make this last effort to invade Ireland, there cannot be the smallest doubt of their total destruction; as in addition to the very superior force of Lord Bridport, Lord Hugh Seymour, with 12 ships of the line, has sailed to prevent the return into Brest of any fugitive ship which may escape Lord Bridport. Thus guarded as our coast is, and with such a well disciplined and well provided army, as we have now in perfect readiness in the country, we should rather wish that the French were destined for Ireland, than by a complete overthrow, their hopes of success may be for ever blasted. However, we most earnestly caution the public against crediting any unfounded rumour that may be circulated on this subject.

The 3d Regiment of Foot Guards, under the command of General Stanwix, will march hence to-morrow, and remain at Nenagh until further orders.

The right-wing of the Coldstream Guards are for the present ordered to be stationed at Banagher—the left-wing to occupy Portumna—and the entire Guards to be under command of Gen. Stanwix.

The Yeomen Infantry took the several Guards in this City, this morning.

General Sir James Duff, Bart. will arrive here to-morrow evening, and take upon him the command of this Garrison and District.

The Elgin Fencibles will march in to this City to-morrow, from Doneraile.
