

Letters from Venice, dated the 13th, mention, that the Russian and Turkish fleets, with a considerable number of transports, had been seen from the heights of Ancona, coming from Corfu. The service which these troops are expected to undertake is, to drive the French out of the Ecclesiastical States and the Neapolitan dominions.

The Russian corps now on their march through Galicia, Austrian Silesia, and Moravia, comprise 45,000 men; magazines are forming in Bohemia for their accommodation. Another Russian army is forming on the Polish frontiers, and consist of 80,000 men.

Letters from Hamburgh mention, that Mr. Wiggers, Agent from that city at Petersburg, was, on the 24th of March, ordered to quit his Imperial Majesty's dominions, but the next day he was told he might remain, as the agent of Lubeck and Bremen.

Six hundred Hanoverians are about to take possession of the port of Cuxhaven, as a matter of necessary precaution.

It is mentioned in several letters, that the King of Prussia will take part with the coalition. A sudden order came to Embden from Berlin just before the departure of the post, ordering that the further exportation of oats should be strictly prohibited from the ports of East Friesland.—The letters add, that they would be wanted for the Prussian Cavalry.

DUBLIN, — May 9.

An extraordinary issue of the Exchequer bills in London, has contributed to a still greater advance in the stocks, consols on Friday last having attained to 56, and all the other funds in proportion.

If a sudden prorogation of Parliament takes place as it is said, the houses, we hear, will meet in July next, as measures intimately connected with the interests of the British Empire cannot, they say, await the slow return of a February session.

Yesterday, his Excellency the Lord Lieutenant went in the usual state to the House of Peers, and gave the royal assent to such bills as were returned from England.

On Wednesday last, in the Court of Exchequer, the motion for setting aside the verdict had in the case of Wright versus Fitzgerald, was refused with full costs against the latter. On this occasion the Chief Baron declared, that so firmly were the innocence and sufferings of that loyal and much injured gentleman, Mr. Wright, rivetted on his mind, that he could not rest that night if he left the Court without declaring the determination of him and his brother Judge.

Clonmel, May 4. Monday, the 2d division of the West York Regiment of Militia, which arrived here on Saturday last, marched hence for Dublin.

Yesterday, the 3d division of the above regiment arrived in town, and this morning continued their route for said place.
