besides, the case of a bridge was injured, and

 question with him was not that of expence, but

 and asked, could it have ever come within the
 view of Parliament to have granted such a profit
 to the undertakers?—clearly not—and notwith-
 standing his respect for the city of Derry, and
 the interests which he held in its prosperity, he
 should vote against this clause.

Mr. Alexander, seeing the sense of the House
 against the clause, withdrew it, and the bill pas-
 sed.—Adjourned to Wednesday.
