

arrived at the end of the line, his Excellency became stationary, and the several corps marching by divisions, passed him in order of quick time, the whole forming again in a body on its former ground.—The General then returned to the Lodge in the Park, his departure having been announced by a discharge of artillery, the entire body began to march on the ground, and arrived in town about past five o'clock, each corps proceeding to its parade ground, where it was dismissed. The Commanders of the several corps were entertained by his Excellency, at the Lodge, in the Phoenix-Parc.

On Thursday, the 9th of May, John O'Connell, eldest son of Henry Harrison, of Bride-Street, this City, Esq.

On Thursday evening, the 14th of May, one of the deserters from the Royal Regiment, was brought into Cork on a cart, and had been shot that morning by a party of Fencibles, which were in close pursuit of the remainder of his wicked companions. He was exposed, suspended to a lamp-iron, as a spectacle of shame, until Friday evening, at which time (about 10 o'clock) another fugitive of the same party, who had been in a prisoner: he was directed to the parade of the Royal Meath Regiment, being officially recognized as a murderer, he was strung up without farther delay. It is hoped that this salutary example will be the means of exposing and preventing the melancholy effects of that mad delusion, which has plunged these wretched men into eternal misery.

Information was received that some of the deserters were in the neighbourhood of Carrigrohane, consequence, General Johnston with the South Devon Regiment, accompanied by Major Cole, and detachments of Yeomen Cavalry, proceeded to Carrigrohane in the evening. The General and his staff returned yesterday evening, but without effecting any of these desperadoes. The General did not arrive at 9 o'clock last night. The Yeomen got some intelligence of their whereabouts yesterday morning. Horses were pressed; and they rode off with great speed. The issue, it may be supposed, was not heard.

On Monday morning, a King's Messenger, with a letter from Admiral Kingmill, was landed at Carrigrohane on one of our Packets; the vessel sailed for Carrigrohane with him immediately on his arrival, though it was expected to arrive in the course of two hours.—Shortly after the vessel failed, another Messenger arrived; and on board the Chapman armed vessel, which was directed for Cork.

Provisions taken for the defence of this City, by means of signal ships, stationed at an equal distance from each other, all round the Harbour, and the excellent station of the Grand Fleet, by which it could be brought to harbour in 42 hours with a good wind, to preclude every possibility of danger to the City, in case the French fleet returned from the Western ocean. If on the other hand the enemy is gone to attack Lord St. John's, it is evident that his Lordship will have no time for fighting either the French or Spanish Armies, before they can form their threatenings. But did they even join their forces, we remember the time when Lord St. John's was the only vessel of the line.
