

in this illustrious member of the House of Bour-

re-establishing regular government and social se-
curity on the defeat of anarchy and licentiousness,
and that for this purpose he joins the army of
the Prince de Conde. The other principal con-
jecture is, that he intends on the French coast of
availing himself of the discontents of the people,
and the defeats of the Directory, to attempt a
counter-revolution. This latter is, however, the
least probable speculation of the two, although
nothing can be more certain than that the mass
of the French people sigh most ardently for the
old order of things, and having sown their poli-
tical wild oats, would eagerly embrace any op-
portunity of restoring the monarchical govern-
ment, under which they were a careless, laugh-
ing, dancing, and happy people; under which
the pipe and tabor animated the plains of Lan-
guedoc, and gave a subject to the pen of Sterne,
which he would vainly seek for now in that de-
formed, vicious, and miserable land.

It must give every friend to the country plea-
sure to find Government have been able to raise

A desperado of the name of M'Daniel, we

Saturday last, two noted insurgents, of the
Co. Wicklow, were apprehended in this City,
through the vigilance of Mr. Alderman James.
One of them is named Gilam (alias Dignum,) the
other Forrittal, who is accused with having
been a leader of Rebels.

We are informed by letters from Wicklow,
that the noted rebel Kerfoot, (mentioned in a for-
mer publication, as lately apprehended in Town-
shend-street, and afterwards sent to Wicklow
to be tried by Court Martial) was executed on
Monday the 20th instant, for the murder of Mr.
Leeson, a yeoman of that part of the country.

The same letters mention that three persons,
of the name of Doyle, brothers, have been exe-
cuted likewise, for that atrocious murder.

The house of a farmer in the neighbourhood of
Mulhuddard, was plundered by a banditti on
Wednesday night last. The freebooters were let
into his house by his servant maid. The owner
had locked it up at night, and taken the keys
into his care; but the treacherous servant had
procured a false key, and with it opened the
doors, and went off with the robbers after they
had rifled the house.

Two offenders, charged with treasonable prac-
tices, were brought into town from the country,
on Saturday, by the Essex Fencibles. The above
prisoners are from the neighbourhood of Rath-
coole; one is named Ryder. They are well
looking young men, and appeared to be sons of
farmers.

In consequence of some reports circulated re-
specting a couple of Yeomen, said to have been
murdered in an house of ill fame, several houses
of that description were on Monday night broken
by the populace, and their furniture of every
kind either demolished or carried off by the mul-
titude, before the arrival of a Magistrate and a
guard could prevent the outrages. Three houses
in Strand-street have been greatly injured and
completely gutted of their contents; a house in
Jervis-street was also attacked, and many valu-
able articles carried off or destroyed, and another
in a stable-lane off Mary-street, has had the floors,
staircase, &c. torn up entirely in the lower part,
exhibiting the most ruinous appearance.

Cork, May 27. Last Friday Lord Bridport's
fleet, consisting of 28 sail of the line and 14 fri-
gates, came to an anchor near Beerhaven, at the
mouth of Bantry Bay. Same evening the Indostan
with a fleet of victuallars sailed from Cove, laden
with stores and necessaries for the fleet.
