

This morning Laurence Hacket, convicted by a General Court Martial, for Coining; and Wm. Callaghan, convicted last Assizes for robbing his employer, were taken from the City Goal by a detachment of the New Romney Dragoons, to New Geneva, from whence they are to be transported—the former for life, the latter for seven years.

The above military escort, took the following prisoners from the County Goal, to be transported pursuant to their sentences by General Court Martials and the Magistrates of this County, viz. We are happy to be able to announce to the Publick, the great utility of the Benevolent Society; it appears from the Books of the Kitchen, that 636 Persons were supplied with 4618 shares of bread and porridge in the last month, and that 148 shares were dispensed on account of Tickets sold at 1s. 1d. per dozen, and that the expence of the whole amounted only to 19l. 11s. 2½d.; within said period 243 Persons were prescribed for and received Medicines.

It is to be hoped from the above statement, which may be depended on, that this useful Institution will receive from a generous and humane Public a liberal support. As we understand that some complaints have been made to the Governors by the Poor, prejudicial to this Charity, we beg leave to suggest the propriety of bringing forward any complaints that may in future be made to the Committee, which sit every Monday morning, when such complaints, we doubt not, will be strictly investigated. The printed forms, which are now distributing, are only for procuring Medical assistance for the Sick; if the object be confined to the House, the recommendation must be directed to the Physicians of that district, if able to come out, to the Physician attending at the Dispensary. Tickets for procuring nourishment for the Indigent, will be given to each Subscriber by the Treasurer, upon payment of the subscription.

For every Carriage, if the streak or shoeing of the Wheels thereof shall be set on with counter-sunk flat headed Nails, Bolts or Screws, and shall be 4 inches or more in breadth, the sum of One Penny, for every Horse or Beast drawing the same—and if the streaks or shoeing of the Wheels thereof shall be set on in like manner, and shall be less than 4 inches, but not less than 3 in breadth, the sum of One-Penny Halfpenny, for every Horse or Beast drawing the same—and if the streaks or shoeing of the Wheels be set on in like manner, and shall be less than 3 inches in breadth, the sum of Two-Pence, for every Horse or other Beast drawing the same—and if the streaks or shoeing of the Wheels of any such Carriage shall be set on with eight or spring-headed Nails, Bolts, or Screws, or with any Nails, Bolts, or Screws, not being counter-sunk and flat-headed, the sum of Two-pence for every Horse or other Beast drawing the same.

For every Horse laden or unladen, the sum of 1½d.—For every drove of Oxen, Cows, or neat Cattle, the sum of 2s. 6d. by the Score, and in proportion for any greater or less number.

For every drove of Calves, Sheep, Lambs, or Pigs, the sum of One Shilling by the Score, and so in proportion for any greater or less number.

Provided always, that for every Car, whose Wheels however narrow they may be, shall be formed and put on so as to turn round the Axle-tree, and whose Axle-tree shall be fixed so as not to turn round with the Wheels, the sum of One Penny only, and no more shall be demanded or taken at every such Gate, for every Horse or other Beast drawing the same, if the streaks or shoeing of such Wheels be set on with counter-sunk flat-headed Nails, Bolts or Screws.

An additional Gate is to be erected on each Road, paying the same Tolls as above, near Croagh and Bruff.
