

Thirteen fail of the line, we are informed, are to be immediately detached from Lord Bridport's fleet, under the command of Capt. Sutton, of the Superb, of 74 guns, to reinforce Lord St. Vincent's fleet, off Cadiz.

In consequence of the supposed arrival of the French fleet in the Mediterranean, it is expected that the several corps of Irish militia which were under orders for England previous to the sailing of the Brest fleet, will now resume their routes for their several destinations.

The Summer Circuits are expected to take place very early this year; the Home Circuit is spoken of as to commence on the 28th inst.

*Cork, June 3.* Thursday evening Lord Bridport, with his whole fleet got under way, and on Friday morning they were all clear off the Mizen Head, steering South, with the Wind North West.

This day Timothy M'Carthy, alias Serjeant Armstrong, was carried from hence to Macrump, where he is to be executed for the murder of the late Robert Hutchinson, Esq.

On Thursday last were taken up at Dunmanway for treasonable practices, by order of Major General St. John, Mark M'Civern, well known for contriving the escape of several of the French prisoners, lately on parole there, with his two sons; also the noted James Doherty.

Married. Yesterday, Mr. Thomas Harman, to Miss Deborah Dudley, of Roscrea.

Died. Last week in Youghall, the Hon. Colville Moore, brother to the late, and uncle to the present Lord Mount-Cashal.

*Waterford, June 4.* Saturday last two men who were tried here by Court Martial, and sentenced to be hung, were sent from hence in one of the gun-boats to Ross, where one of them was to be executed; the other was to be sent to Wexford, where he was also to suffer death. The one was convicted of the murder of the son of the toll-collector of Ross-Bridge; the other for being a leader in the rebellion, and confining a number of women in a house, threatening to make an "Orange pie" of them, by which was meant that they should be burnt.—The women above-mentioned, it was imagined, would have met their threatened fate, but for a party of yeomen who rescued them, after attacking and putting to route the fellows who were guarding the house.

For every Coach, &c. drawn by 6 Horses, 0 2  
For do. by 4 Horses, 0 2  
For do. by 2 or 3 Horses, 0 1  
For do. by 1 Horse, 0 0

For every Carriage, if the streak or shoeing the Wheels thereof shall be set on with count sunk flat headed Nails, Bolts or Screws, and shall be 4 inches or more in breadth, the sum of One Penny, for every Horse or Beast drawing the same and if the streaks or shoeing of the Wheels thereof shall be set on in like manner, and shall be less than 4 inches, but not less than 3 in breadth, the sum of One-Penny Halfpenny, for every Horse or Beast drawing the same—and if the streaks or shoeing the Wheels be set on in like manner, and shall be less than 3 inches in breadth, the sum of Two Pence, for every Horse or other Beast drawing the same—and if the streaks or shoeing of the Wheels of any such Carriage shall be set on with eight spring-headed Nails, Bolts, or Screws, or with any Nails, Bolts, or Screws, not being counter-sunk and flat-headed, the sum of Two-pence for every Horse or other Beast drawing the same.

For every Horse laden or unladen, the sum of 10s. 1/2d.—For every drove of Oxen, Cows, or near Cattle, the sum of 2s. 6d. by the Score, and in proportion for any greater or less number.

For every drove of Calves, Sheep, Lambs, or Pigs, the sum of One Shilling by the Score, and in proportion for any greater or less number.

Provided always, that for every Car, whose Wheels however narrow they may be, shall be formed and put on so as to turn round the Axle-tree, and whose Axle-tree shall be fixed so as not to turn round with the Wheels, the sum of One Penny only, and no more shall be demanded or taken at every such Gate, for every Horse or other Beast drawing the same, if the streaks or shoeing of such Wheels be set on with counter-sunk flat headed Nails, Bolts or Screws.

An additional Gate is to be erected on each Road, paying the same Tolls as above, near Croagh and Braff.
