

by they were driven from Wallentian and Vardenberg, on which occasion they also lost 3 pieces of cannon. On the 19th, the enemy with very superior force, made a severe attack on the corps commanded by Col. Cavacini, at Wallentstadt, but was completely repulsed on this occasion. The battalion of Swiss emigrants, commanded by Col. Rovorca, (which formed a part of the Colonel's corps,) was engaged for the first time; it suffered a good deal, and behaved with great bravery. The enemy is now in full retreat from the Pockenbourg, and canton of Appenzell. The Austrian patrols entered St. Gall the night before last, and found between Rheineck and that place 13 pieces of ordnance, besides a great quantity of ammunition, which the French had abandoned in their retreat. On the whole, the enemy's loss in this quarter, from the 14th to this day, exclusive of killed and wounded, may be estimated at near 4000 prisoners, and 36 pieces of cannon. Gen. Bellegarde is at Chiavenna.

[The above Gazette contains an account of the capture of Tortona, which is the key of Piedmont, by the combined armies; also the fortrets of Ivrea, which secures to them the valley of Aost. Thirty pieces of cannon, a vast quantity of ammunition, &c. were found in the latter place. It likewise enumerates several important advantages gained over the enemy by the corps under Gen. Hotze, in which the former lost a considerable number of men, and several pieces of cannon.]

LONDON, — June 6 & 7.

This day Mr. Wickham, Under Secretary of State, set out from London to proceed with the utmost expedition to his former station in Switzerland, where, by the present very auspicious state of things, it is conceived that his presence, knowledge of the people, and means of influence, may most essentially promote the cause of the Confederacy. This mission is the result of the rapid success of the Austrian arms, as well as of the impression which the tyranny, practised by the French in the countries they have over-run, has had on the minds of the Swiss.

According to the last advices from India, a war with Tippoo is considered as inevitable.

HOUSE OF COMMONS — June 6.

Mr. Secretary Dundas brought from the King the following Message:

GEORGE R.

His Majesty thinks proper to acquaint this House, that he had some time since concluded an eventual engagement with his good Brother and Ally, the Emperor of Russia, for employing 45,000 men against the common enemy in such manner as the state of affairs in Europe at that period appeared to render most advantageous. — The change of circumstances which has since arisen, having rendered a different application of that force more desirable, his Majesty has recently had the satisfaction to learn that the views of the Emperor of Russia in that respect are entirely conformable to his own. But his Majesty has not yet received any account that the formal engagement to that effect have been regularly concluded. He has, however, the satisfaction of knowing that the same promptitude and zeal in support of the common cause which his Ally has already manifested in a manner so honourable to himself and so signally beneficial to Europe, have induced him already to put this army in motion towards the place of its destination, as now settled by mutual consent. His Majesty therefore thinks it right to acquaint the House of Commons that

His Majesty has been pleased to appoint Hen. Charles Sirr, Esq; to be Town-Major of the Garrison of Dublin, vice Nicholls, resigned.

His Excellency has been pleased to appoint William Bellingham Swan, Esq; to be Assistant Town-Major of the Garrison of Dublin, in the room of Henry C. Sirr, promoted.

The General Court-Martial, of which Col. Deering was President, is dissolved, the Regiments from which most of the Members were composed, having marched hence.

On the evening of Tuesday the 4th instant, Colonel Sir Vere Hunt, Bart's Regiment of Infantry, consisting of 720 strong, embarked in high spirits at the Isle of Wight for Jersey, where the Regiment are to remain until further orders.

On Saturday last, William Crouch, of Charleville, in the County of Cork, Gent. was admitted an Attorney of His Majesty's Court of Common Pleas.

The Squadron of British Flying Artillery which were attached to the Foot Guards, arrived here yesterday — and to-morrow will proceed for their former quarters at Mallow.

Saturday evening, a soldier of the Longford Militia, bathing in the river near Clare Castle, was unfortunately drowned.

On Sunday morning, the following melancholy event took place in this City: two young women, Mary Tuthill and Mary Kennedy, the former about 16, the latter 12 years of age, went to bathe at the end of Sir Harry's-Mall, when dreadful to relate, they both perished: they were children of two Widows, whose wretched situation is worthy the attention of the humane and charitable!

Sunday's Post brought a route for the 41st and Elgin Highland Regiments, quartered in this City; — in consequence of which, on Monday morning the former marched hence for Cork; and in the evening the latter for Donetaile, Mallow, &c.

Monday evening the left wing of the Foot Guards, consisting of the Brigade from the 3d Regiment, marched into this City from Nenagh; and yesterday part of the right wing, formed from the Coldstream Regiment, arrived here from Birr, and are to occupy their former barracks until further orders.

Yesterday the following five men, viz. Richard Elliot, Patrick Henrey, Martin Callaghan, Thos. Neaven, and Denis Griffin, were taken from the County Gaol by a guard of the Romney Cavalry, on their way to New Geneva, from whence they are to be transported agreeable to the sentence of a General Court Martial.
