

some time ago, our readers will recollect, that we mentioned large orders being sent to Antzic and other ports for wheat, it is with some concern we now find, that the supply expected from these orders will probably be much smaller than we had reason to hope, as so many vessels from the several sea ports of England had arrived altogether at Danzic, that a rise of near 20 per cent. had taken place, viz. from 480 to 500 Polish florins. This disappointment, we hope, will be little felt in Ireland, their being the greatest prospect of a plentiful harvest in all our own countries.

Linens which used to be sold at 1s. 7d. per yard, were sold at the market of Belfast on the 15th instant, at 3s. 1d.

An Ox of uncommon size was on Friday last exhibited in Ormond Market, and on Saturday the beef was meted to the curious, at from 2s. 6d. to 3s. the pound!

Tuesday last, a soldier of the Galway regt. who occupies a room on Barrack-hill, Cork, intending to procure fire to light his pipe, put some powder in the pan of a musket, for the purpose of communicating the flash to a piece of rag; as he held the piece in an horizontal position, directly opposite a poor woman, wife to a soldier of the Limerick regiment, who happened to be in bed in the room, it went off and shot her thro' both her legs in so shocking a manner, that it is feared amputation will be necessary.

Tuesday, a Court Martial sat at the Barracks. The first business the Court proceeded on was the trial of some persons charged with the murder of Mrs. Grattan and her daughter near Edenderry. There are more than 12 in prison for that atrocious crime.

Two Rebels, named Clinch and Cooke, have been convicted by the Court Marcial sitting at the Barrack, and will this day be executed in Fingal, the scene of their crimes.

Friday last was apprehended by Mr. Justice Drury, in the Liberty, a man charged with being a principal in the murder, in the County of Kildare, of Mr. Spencer, late agent to his Grace the Duke of Leinster.
