

his professional experience, he could assert to have been misrepresented by some of the witnesses, though by no means, as he thought, designedly, and which the House ought to be apprised of before it came to a final decision. To the abilities of Mr. Law and Mr. Dallas, Counsel for the Petitioners, he bore the highest testimonies of approbation, but thought they had not yet been furnished with sufficient means of bringing the question properly before the House.

Lord Grenville said, he must resist any thing, the tendency of which might be to prolong the consideration of this question till too late a period of the Session. The learned and ingenious Counsel at the bar had every opportunity of producing such evidence as their cause might require heretofore, and though he did not directly oppose the log-books moved for by the Royal Personage, being brought up as materials to be used in the debate, he would resist any sort of examination, which should protract their decision before Monday next.

The Duke of Clarence replied, that on so important an occasion his motives could not be mistaken; he had no other object but that the House should be in full possession of the merits of the question, before it decided on it, and had nothing less in his intention than that the evidence proposed should lead to any unnecessary delay.

Lord Romney thought that the vast property embarked in this trade deserved serious and mature deliberation, before the traffic should be abridged or abolished.

Lord Grenville persisted in his determination to oppose any examination of witnesses by the Counsel, or any thing else which might prevent their coming to a final decision on the subject in dispute on Monday next.

The Lord Chancellor observed, that any person who had witnessed, or were in the least acquainted with the abilities of the Counsel for the Petitioners, must know that they would be prepared by Monday for any part of a subject with which they were so well acquainted.

After a few observations more from Lord Grenville, the Duke of Clarence, and Lord Kinnoul, it was agreed that the Debate upon the general question on the third reading should take place on Monday next, to which time the House adjourned.
