his professional experience, he could affert to have been mifrepresented by some of the witnesses, though by no means, as he thought, delignedly, and which the House ought to be apprifed of before it came to a final decision. To the abilities of Mr. Law and Mr. Dallas, Counfel for the Pesitioners, he bore the highest restimonies of approbation, but thought they had not yet been farnished with fufficient means of bringing the question properly before the House.

Lord Grenville faid, he must refist any thing, the tendency of which might be to prolong the confideration of this question till roo late a period of the Seffion. The learned and ingenious Counfel at the bar had every opportunity of producing such evidence as their cause might require herecofore, and though he did not directly oppose the log-books moved for by the Royal Perlonage, being brought up as materials to be used in the debate, he would refilt any fort of examination, which thould protract their decision before Monday next,

The Duke of Clarence replied, that on fo important an occasion his motives could not be miftaken; he had no other object but that the House should be in full possession of the merits of the question, before it decided on it, and had nothing less in his intention than that the evidence proposed should lead to any unnecessary delay.

Lord Romney thought that the vast property embarked in this trade deferved serious and mature deliberation, before the traffic should be

abridged or abolished.

Lord Grenville perfitted in his derermination to oppose any examination of witnesses by the Counfel, or any thing elfe which might prevent their coming to a final decision on the subject in dispute on Monday next.

The Lord Chancellor observed, that any perfon who had witneffed, or were in the least acquainted with the abilities of the Counsel for the Petitioners, must know that they would be prepared by Monday for any part of a subject with

which they were fo well acquainted.

After a few observations more from Lord Grenville, the Duke of Clarence, and Lord Kinnoul, t was agreed that the Debate upon the general uestion on the third reading should take place n Monday next, to which time the House adourned.
