

ing able to say these ships arrived lately at Gibraltar on the morning of the 8th.

In our paper of Wednesday last we mentioned that the Emperor Paul had applied to the Court of Stockholm for an auxiliary force of 8000 men, and 8 ships of the line, to make part of the expedition now in preparation against the enemy. We have every reason to believe that his Swedish Majesty has acceded to this request; as it has been notified to the Merchants of Sweden that it will be dangerous for any more Swedish vessels to enter the ports of France, there being reason to presume that they will be detained.

The Governors of Tangier and Dey of Algiers have lately convoked the Consuls of the European nations, and communicated the determination of the Emperor of Morocco, that he should consider himself at war with any of the powers who should take part in favour of the French against the Ottoman Porte.

A notice similar to that given to the Swedish merchants has been privately intimated to the Prussians resident here, of the probable danger of continuing their mercantile dealings with France: and what establishes to our conviction a meditated rupture between Prussia and France is, that "application has been made through the Prussian Minister to our Cabinet for a convoy for Prussian vessels navigating the Northern Ocean."

We believe, that the King of Prussia will act in concert with the secret expedition now in preparation in this country: and whatever may be its destination, Holland will doubtless be his scene of action. We are led to this opinion by a vast combination of circumstances, and by letters from Brunswick, Munster, Duisburg, &c. which concur in stating the strong probability of renewed hostilities.

A letter from Brunswick, dated the 14th of July, mentions that General Pichegrue had been here for some days, and that during his stay he had frequent and long conferences with the Duke on the subject, it is said, of the meditated invasion of the Batavian States. Pichegrue is perfectly acquainted with the Country, having conducted the war into it in 1794 and 1795.

The hostile disposition of Prussia towards France is manifested in the permission given to the Russian troops now marching through his dominions to the Rhine. Some months since an application was made to the Cabinet of Berlin for the sufferance now granted, but it was then denied, and the refusal was accompanied by a strong declaration on the subject.

Several Dutch families residing at Brunswick had received letters from their relatives in Holland, which invariably represent the coast to be nearly destitute of troops, the greater part of the force of the country being concentrated in East Friesland, Guelders, &c. along the Prussian frontiers, and line of demarkation, it being generally understood that his Prussian Majesty's intentions were hostile to the existing Government. They said that the Stadtholderian party had become very numerous, and that the people in General were anxious for its being re-established.

The Duke of Kent sailed yesterday from Portsmouth, on board the Arethusa frigate, to his destination at Halifax.

The Duke de Broglie is to command the corps of the Prince de Conde, destined to act with the Prussians on the Rhine.

A letter from L'Espeigne, of 16 guns, relates, that Captain Borden had sent an Officer with a flag of Truce, respecting prisoners, into the hands of some Dutch gun-vessels, which in defiance of the established usage of civilized nations, were taken into his boat and detained her.
