

After the signature of the present capitulation, hostages shall be mutually exchanged.—The part of the French, a Brigadier and a Captain, on that of the Austrians a Colonel and a Captain.—Granted.

II. During the management of the Capitulation, there shall be cessation of hostilities on both sides.—Granted.

III. Migliarello shall be occupied by a battalion of Austrians, from which 50 men shall be detached to occupy the outer part of the gate of the castle.—The two armies shall have no communication with each other, Commanding Officers, and those who have leave from their respective Generals excepted.—Granted.

IV. The Commissary of the Executive Power and the Inspector General of the Police of the Alpine Republic at Mantua, shall have leave to go wherever they please.—Granted.

V. A sufficient number of carriages shall be allowed for the carriage of the effects, not only of the officers composing the garrison, but all such as not being present may have left their baggage.—Granted.

XVI. Two carriages shall be granted for the use of the General, and for the suite of such officers as shall have been ordered by him to follow the lot of the garrison.—Granted.

XVII. The Generals and other Officers may send any part of their baggage to France with their troops:—unless indeed General Kray, who always acts like a man of the highest honour and liberality, consents that the Officers should share the same fortune with the men, and be permitted to return to France prisoners on their parole. Answer.—Regulated by Article I.

Additional Article.—All Deserters shall be given up to their respective Battalions.—General Kray promises them their life.

LONDON.—August 17 & 19.

The Senate of Hamburgh has at length yielded to the demands of our Court, supported by the menaces of Russia; and Napper Tandy has actually been delivered to the British Envoy.

Lord Robert Fitzgerald the British Minister at Copenhagen, has obtained leave of absence for six months. The Russian Minister has also quitted that capital. These circumstances have given birth to much rumour and speculation, amongst others it has been asserted, that the Court of Denmark is menaced with hostilities by the Coalesced Powers upon the one hand, in consequence of its partiality to France; and by France on the other, in case of its permitting the Russian armament to pass through the Sound.

Whatever the original plan of the French in their late Expedition might have been, it has utterly failed; but in their return to Brest they have taken a most effectual means of securing the fidelity of the Court of Spain, by carrying in with them the Cadiz fleet.

Lord Keith, with 31 ships of the line, arrived off the port of Brest on Tuesday afternoon. The utmost exertion was made by every ship of the fleet to come up with the enemy, but they had too much the start of them.

The Right Hon. Mr. Beresford, and the Hon. the Speaker, have sailed for England.

Monday, Pat. Reck, alias Parrital, tried by a Court-Martial at the barracks, on Saturday the 27th of July, for the cruel murder of N. James, in the co. of Wexford, on the 5th of July, 1798, and found guilty, was taken from the Provost prison, and conveyed under an escort of cavalry to the New Prison, and executed pursuant to his sentence. He was a young man about 22 years of age.—This wretch far from feeling contrition at the dreadful crime of deliberate murder, which he acknowledged himself to have perpetrated, vaunted of his villainy, and glorying (in terms too abominable for recital) in the wickedness he had committed, actually praised the moment before he was turned off, for the success of the good cause. Such are the effects of a system, which by exalting the foulest crime into merits, when committed to serve a party, confounds and overwhelms both the feelings of conscience and the principles of morality!

Monday last the Leeward Island West India Fleet, 150 sail, passed by Cork harbour, under convoy of his Majesty's ships Santa-Margareta and Matilda. The Santa-Margareta captured last Tuesday se'nnight, a very large vessel from the Isle of France, supposed to be an East India ship of immense value.
