

Frances would allow: and on the 29th of June, off Genoa, fell in with Lord Keith, who on the 30th, ordered her to proceed with dispatches to Lord Nelson and Sir Sidney Smith. The next day, being becalmed under the island of Capria, a French gun-vessel of considerable force, by means of her sweeps, came up with, and engaged the *Mary-Ann*, from whom by the same means she speedily retreated, nor attempted to renew the fight till protected by the fire of a battery. Our little vessel on the 12th of July joined Lord Nelson at Naples, from whence, when refitted, she was to proceed to seek *Le Tigre*.

We yesterday received letters from St. Marcou, dated on the preceding day. They relate that an encampment had taken place between La Hogue and Iligoy River, but it appeared not to contain any troops.

The French have recently equipped several vessels in the Mediterranean, on the plan of the Barbary corsairs, all carrying very heavy guns, and some of them working 130 sweeps, or oars, by which during the calms so prevalent in those seas, they move with great rapidity.

The Barbadoes Paper of the 25th of May, mentions the prevalence of a dangerous and rapid bilious fever, which had carried off many persons.

We hear that the fortunate purchasers of the Ticket No. 9,065, drawn a prize of 10,000*l.* the 15th inst. are two Ladies that keep a Boarding-school at Elham, in Kent.

General Hulke having left Barham Downs on Tuesday, the command of the Camp has devolved on Lieutenant General Sir Charles Grey, who reviewed the whole line yesterday forenoon at 11. Nothing could exceed the healthy appearance of the troops, who are as fine a body of men as ever were sent on any service. They appear very anxious to go abroad, and to contribute their efforts in restoring the Stadtholder.

The conveyance of the Militia Volunteers to their respective regiments has been attended with very considerable expence to Government. In the Chelmsford division alone upwards of 500*l.* have been paid for waggons and carriages of various descriptions.

Three men were last week executed at Ilchester, for horse stealing. Previous to their being taken from the gaol they appeared perfectly collected and unmoved, but at the place of execution their fortitude forsook them. After the Clergyman had left them they were still anxious to pray, but so ignorant were they of all form that they incoherently repeated parts of different prayers totally irrelevant to their situation. Three or four times they repeated what the children of poor people are usually taught in bed, viz. "Marhew, Mark, Luke, and John, God bless the bed that I lie on; four corners to my bed, four Angels lay a spread:" and so on to the end of that ancient piece of nurse's poetry:—a sad instance of despair and ignorance.
