

ter having expelled the rest of the French from that country, will march to Switzerland, to unite itself, under the command of Marshal Suwarrow, with that which replace the Austrians. This army will be augmented by the Swiss and Wirtembergian troops in the pay of England.

On this plan, each army is commanded by a General of its own nation. The left wing of the army of Switzerland communicates with that of Italy, from which, when necessary, it will receive assistance. The right wing will join the army of the Rhine, with which its movements will be concerted.—The object of Marshal Suwarrow will be to reach the frontiers of France. Then Monsier (Count d'Artois), at the head of the corps of Conde, and of the Swiss troops of which he is Colonel General, will issue a proclamation in the name of Louis XVIII. concerted with the Allied Powers; and this proclamation will be immediately followed by the entrance of the army which will endeavour to penetrate towards Paris, thro' Burgundy. In the mean time the Archduke, after having forced the French to evacuate the Right bank of the Rhine, will blockade Mayence, or even besiege that key of the empire, and excite an insurrection in the Electorates on the left bank, and form a junction with the Anglo-Russian army of Holland.

The transports that have been taken up to carry the troops to the Continent, have been mostly hired for three months certain, and the general price has been 6l. per ton per month.

The Eagle, Dutch prison ship, at Chatham, is ordered to be converted into a hospital ship, in lieu of the Victory, of 100 guns, which is ordered to be docked and fitted for service.

The celebrated Mr. Whaley, of Jerusalem memory, laid a wager of 7000l. on St. Swithin's day, being July 15. that it would rain 40 days according to tradition.

A young Lady with a fortune of 80,000l. to whom a banker in this city paid his addressees, and to whom her friends expected she would have been married, eloped last week with a dashing Hibernian for Grena Green.

On Thursday last a young Lady eloped from Kensington with an Hibernian youth, who brought her to his apartments in Brook-street, where, not having money enough to discharge the post boy, some words ensued; in consequence of which, the boy went back to inform the Lady's friends of the circumstance, who arrived about 5 o'clock on Friday morning, when a regular siege commenced. About ten, her brother found means to enter the house and finding the Irishman had made his escape the back way, he conducted her (to her no small mortification) through the crowd to a hackney coach, which was waiting. We understand it was the intention of the gallant to have proceeded to Grena Green, as soon as he could have procured the necessary supplies.

A few days ago, died at Osborn's Hotel, in the Adelphi, Charles Barber, Esq; lately a free-merchant at Calcutta, and chief partner in the well-known house of Barber, Palmer, and Co. the business of which for some years is supposed to have cleared 30,000l. per annum.—This gentleman had realized in India upwards of 200,000l. he had lodged 80,000l. in the English funds, and brought home with him 100,000l. in Danish bills. He arrived in the last fleet, and had been at the Hotel only about a week. He was about 40 years of age. He declared on his death-bed he did not know he had any relation, and that it was out of his power to name an heir to his great wealth. Inquiries are on foot to discover the proper heir, and a young woman, who says she is a second cousin by the mother's side, has appeared; but attempts are making to discover a nearer relation.

Saint Swithin, during the present year, has rigidly preserved his injurious influence; it rained on his anniversary, and with partial exemptions during the forty succeeding days. His reign expired last week.—On the banks of the Moselle which are universally planted with vines, the peasants assemble on St. Swithin's day to pay their homage to the Saint, and to invoke dry weather for their vintage. His effigy in wood, but richly dressed, is carried about with great pomp and rejoicings should the day prove dry; but should it rain, the Saint is grossly abused, beat, and thrown over the bridge of Coblenz into the Moselle, the people religiously believing, that if it rains on St. Swithin's day, it will rain for 40 days after, and if fine on that day, they will have a luxuriant and well saved vintage.
