

ward to the rapid release of Holland, from the savage grasp of French fraternity, and consequently the recovery of the remaining six Provinces.

Helder, is the name of the most northerly coast of the Peninsula of Holland, to the southward of the Texel Island, along which on the starboard, with that Island on the larboard, is the channel into the Texel Road within the Island.—There are three channels by which ships come from seaward to this point of land; and the Land-deep, which runs up northward along the shore; the Slenk, which is between the Keyser's Flat and the South Sand, and the Spaniard's Gat, between the Texel Island and the Keyser's Flat. All these unite athward of the N. W. point of the Helder.

Colonel Hay, who lost his life at the attack upon Fort Helder, was one of Sir R. Abercromby's Aid-de-Camps while Commander-in-Chief in this country in the beginning of 1798.—Sir Jas. Pulteney, who was wounded, is one of the richest subjects of England, and husband to Lady Bath.

A proclamation has been issued by the Privy Council, offering a reward of 200l. for each of the persons concerned in setting fire to the Chapel of Kilmurry, in the County of Wicklow, on the night of the 26th of August last.

LONDON, Sept. 2 & 3.

Dispatches from Sir Ralph Abercrombie and Lord Duncan were brought yesterday afternoon by Lieut. Col. Maitland and Major Kempr; and by Capt. Oughton of the Isis, and Capt. Hope of the Kent. The naval and military details were published this morning in an Extraordinary Gazette;—an Extra-Gazette contains also dispatches from Lord Nelson, with an account of the surrender of Capua, and Gaeta, by capitulation. The French troops in Capua amounted to 2800; in Gaeta to 1500. The taking of these two places, both of which are very strong, completes the conquest of Naples from the French.

The Duke of York's baggage waggon is now before the Horse Guards, going off to Barham Downs. Royal Highness follows on Thursday, and in a few days another large armament will sail for land, the conquest of which is now regarded by Ministers as almost certain. Time will shew whether they have formed a just opinion. Private letters by the Hamburgh Mail received yesterday state, that Buonaparte had made his retreat into Egypt, and had arrived at Alexandria.
