"Yesterday being the Anniversary of the bat- tle of Colony, where, by the gallant and well- timed attack of Colonel Vereker, with his party of Spartan Heroes, accompanied by detachments from three or four Yeomanry Corps, the whole body of the French and Rebel army were so dis- comfited, as to be driven from their avowed purpose of plundering this town. The Officers and privates of the above regiment, together with the Inhabitants, having formed themselves into different societies for the purpose of commem- orating so glorious an event, dedicated the lat- ter part of the day to festivity and congratula- tions, (the Privates having experienced the bounty of their Colonel in a liberal pecuniary gratuity.)

—At night a ball and supper was given by Mrs. Major Smith, to the Officers of the garrison.— The ball opened with the very applicable country dance of "*Humber's Mistake*."


