We have not heard that they have joined Gen. Abercrombie in any considerable number, and it is of little importance to the object of the expedition that their hearts are with us, if their arms are against us.

Mr. East, the messenger, arrived yesterday at Lord Grenville's Office, with dispatches from Lord Minto, his Majesty's Ambassador at the Court of Vienna. The contents of these have not publicly transpired; but it was reported that the French had obtained some further advantages in Switzerland, and some went so far as to say, that the Archduke Charles had lost 8000 men in a general action.—It was also rumoured that the Messenger brought advice of the King of Prussia having put his army in motion.—[*St. J. Chron.*]

Previous to the departure of the Dutch fleet from the Texel, three thousand of their crews entered into the Prince of Orange's military service.

The second division of the Russian troops arrived at the Texel on Wednesday last.

Saturday morning, Lieut. Short arrived at the Admiralty from the coast of Holland; and we are sorry to learn, that the Contest gun-veffel, mounting ten carronades, commanded by this officer, is lost, having been driven on a shoal-bank during the late tempestuous weather. Two of her crew, eager to leave the wreck, in hope of swimming to shore, threw themselves over-board and were drowned in the surf.

As soon as the news of the capture of Seringapatam was known at Madras, Lord Mornington, accompanied by Lord Clive, set out for that capital, to settle the new Government. It is very generally understood, that the King of Mysore, who was detained as a prisoner by Tippoo Sulthan, would be restored to his Hereditary Dominions which Hyder Ally had usurped, and that the other provinces which had been conquered by Hyder Ally, and annexed to his usurpations, would be partly restored to their original possessors, paying tribute, and acknowledging the paramount Sovereignty of the Company, while the seaports will be taken possession of by the English, as a security to their own dominions.

The treasure taken at Seringapatam amounts to Three Millions Sterling. The specie was much wanted, as all trade at Madras was at a stand for want of money. The latest letters state—that it had already revived, in consequence of the money which would come into circulation by the capture of Seringapatam. The booty falls to the British forces; but in consequence of the scarcity of money, the East-India Company is to be allowed to borrow it for a limited time.

D U B L I N.—Sept. 19.

The Right Hon. the Earl of Clare arrived in town on Monday. His Lordship is to sail for England in a few days, and during his absence the Seals will be held in commission by the Right Hon. Lord Kilwarden, Lord Carleton, and Baron Smith.

It is inferred, and with some justice, that as the King of Prussia lavished presents on Mr. Grenville on quitting Berlin, the Courts remain in a state of friendship. But the acts of mere politeness should not blind us against striking facts.—Sweden, after professing an ardour in the war, has cooled; the Russian and English Ministers have not only left Berlin, but Copenhagen; and it is fair to conclude, these two Courts have a secret understanding to maintain their neutrality. The conduct of Britain and Russia, though it may not drive those powers into actual hostility, puts their neutrality in great danger; and if they were to be arrayed on the side of France, the only side they seem willing to take, they would not only cut off all our communications with the Continent, but more than counterbalance the weight Russia has thrown into the scale

likely to sustain his temporal power vigorously.—Cardinal Ruffo, the brave and spirited churchman who never yielded to the power of the French assassins, and who restored his Sovereign to his Throne, will most probably and most justly be elevated to the Chair of St. Peter.

The export of salted beef has already commenced. 32 tierces were entered on Saturday for London, so that we expect large entries of beef, and also butter to follow, especially as there are several vessels from Liverpool and London in the harbour and river, and on the abovementioned day, the Perseverance and the Newry entered from the latter port, and the Britannia from Bristol. There were also several thousand yards of linen and sheeting entered on said day for Virginia, both for and not for bounty.

The Eliza, Capt. Long, one of the homeward bound Jamaica fleet, arrived at Cork, on Sunday. **DIED.** A few days ago in Londonderry Dr. Balfour.

We are concerned to state, that in consequence of several recent acts of violence, &c. having taken place in the Counties of Tipperary and Waterford, Martial Law has been again revived in the above Counties, by order of Lieutenant-General Lake, who has issued the following Proclamation:—

“Lieut. Gen. Lake, commanding the Southern District, requires all persons within the Counties of Tipperary and Waterford, to put upon their doors a list of the inhabitants belonging to the respective houses, and it shall not be admitted as an excuse, that such list has been torn or defaced, as it must be immediately replaced. He also directs that no person, on any pretext whatever, without a pass from the General of the District, shall be absent from his house between the hours of 8 o'clock at night and sunrise the next morning, on pain of suffering the punishment ordered to be inflicted by the Insurrection Act, under which these Counties stand at present proclaimed.—Patroles will be sent out in every direction to take up all such persons who act contrary to this notice.”

On Friday last, a meeting of the Magistracy and Gentlemen of the towns and neighbourhood of Clonmel and Featherhard, was held at the former place, to consider of effectual means to check the growing spirit of insurrection which has made its appearance in that part of the Country, when resolutions were entered into, one of which was to grant a reward of 200l. to any person who shall give information of an armed meeting of insurgents, so as they may be attacked by the military.

Wednesday last, the Lord Chancellor failed from Dublin for England.
