It may tend to prevent several Persons from incurring the Penalties annexed, by their perusing the following Clauses of the late Revenue Act:

Money for porter, beer, ale, or spirits, sold to unlicensed retailers, shall not be recovered; nor shall any unlicensed retailer recover from any person, any sum of money on account of liquors sold by such unlicensed retailers.

10l. penalty on a Distiller, or dealer in spirits, selling spirits to an unlicensed retailer.

5l. penalty on a Brewer selling beer or ale to an unlicensed retailer.

Distillers, or wholesale dealers, shall not recover any sum of money for spirits sold to unlicensed retailers; and such retailers may recover back the value of spirits sold to them.

40s. penalty, or one month's imprisonment, on any person buying less than two gallons of spirits, or ten gallons of beer, or ale, in any house not having a painted shew-board over the door.

No person entitled to retail spirits until certified for by the Magistrates, and license money paid.

10l. penalty on paying Journeymen, Labourers, or Servants, at a public-house; and such payments void.
