

sent to Holland, for the service of our army. The biscuit-bakers in Wapping are working night and day to complete the orders. A great quantity of live cattle, as well as salted provisions, is also about to be sent.

Mardenbic, where Admiral Mitchell was on the 26th ult. is one of the lowest places in Holland, and for that reason the dams or dykes there are the strongest, particularly when the wind blows from the Northward. In very violent storms, the inhabitants find it necessary to lay sails over them, by which it has been found that the force of the waves is considerably broken.

There is no certain advices of the Archduke having gained possession of Manheim; the report altogether rests on the authority of a Messenger, who says he heard it while on his route.

The military stores in the late Tippoo Sultan's arsenals, are said to amount to a very considerable depot, which are supposed to have been thrown into Mangalore by the French ships.

Sir John Parnell, with his daughter, who is in a bad state of health, sailed last Tuesday from Falmouth on board the King George packet for Lisbon.

This morning at 4 o'clock, Mr. Justice Ford, with Townsend and Sayer, the Bow-street officers, apprehended at Durant's Hotel, Jermyn-street, Admiral Sir John Ord, on a charge of an intention to fight a duel with the Earl of St. Vincent, on account of a dispute that took place while they were both in command in the Mediterranean.—The officers remained with Admiral Ord, and at ten o'clock Mr. Ford took bail, the Admiral in 2,000l. and two sureties in 1,000l. each. Mr. Ford, accompanied by the officers, then set off express to Brentwood to bind over the Earl of St. Vincent in the same manner. The Earl was waiting there for Admiral Ord, as Brentwood was the place appointed. We are extremely happy to find two such excellent officers have been prevented from endangering their lives in such a contest.

There is no authority left to the discretion of the acting Commander in Chief to allow volunteers who may offer their services to act with the army in Holland, as may be seen by the following letter from General Sir William Fawcett's Secretary, in answer to a letter from Sir E. Harrington, requesting permission to join the army under his Royal Highness the Duke of York as a volunteer:

Horse Guards, September 27, 1799.

"SIR,

"In answer to your letter of the 26th inst. I have the honour, by command of General Sir William Fawcett, to acquaint you, that the approbation of your Commanding Officer would be a necessary preliminary to the accomplishment of your request; but that at all events there is no authority here to allow volunteers to join the army under his Royal Highness the Duke of York's orders.—I have the honour to be, Sir, your most obedient humble servant,

COUNTRY NEWS.

Cork, October 2. Monday evening his Majesty's frigate Crecent sailed, having 41 sail of merchant ships under convoy, for the West Indies, Lisbon, and America.—The Creeping Kate, one of the Fleet put back with the loss of her bowsprit.

Waterford, October 5. Thursday last nine prisoners were brought in here from Dungarvan, 7 of whom were committed to the county jail, and the other two lodged in the guard-house. One of the former was a young man of respectable appearance, and, we learn, possessed of good property.

Yesterday morning in a heavy gale of wind from the N. W. a lighter, going down the river, laden with coals, suddenly filled and sunk. The two men were fortunately saved—the one by swimming, and the other by clinging to an ear, till boats arrived to take them up.

At the same time an apprentice belonging to a brig lying at the Parade, while coming ashore, was forced off the stage by the violence of the wind, and seen no more!—The body was not found yesterday evening.

On the 29th ult. Henry Loftus Tottenham, Esq; was sworn Sovereign of Ross, Rev. Edward Carr, Deputy Sovereign, and Robert Bedford, Bailiff, for the ensuing year.

Clonmel, October 5. Last Thursday, the Royal Lancashire Regiment of Militia, commanded by Colonel Stanley, marched hence for Waterford, to embark for England.—During a year's residence in these quarters, the conduct of the above regiment was such, as caused their removal to be sincerely regretted by every well-disposed inhabitant of Clonmel.

And on the same day, and the following day, the Royal Lancashire Volunteers, commanded by Lord Grey De Wilton, marched in here, to remain until further orders.
