

was in exile, or in the evening of life. In the kingdom of Naples, some of the first characters in the country for titles and fortunes with numbers of every order of the State, amongst the rest, the Cardinal Archbishop of the Capital, were very closely attached to the Revolution, the most of whom however, have since suffered death; but for the flagrant rapacity of French Agents, the number would have been considerably greater.

The following anecdote of the brave and able Colonel Hay, we feel a pleasure in recording.—When serving abroad last war, a live shell thrown from a neighbouring battery, happened to fall close by the side of a private soldier, who was then tied fast to the halberts, undergoing the sentence of his Court-Martial; the sudden appearance of so destructive an evil created such terror and alarm amongst the persons attending the punishment, as to occasion them to fly in all directions, to avoid, if possible, the impending danger. The Colonel, regardless of his own safety, deliberately took from his waistcoat pocket a penknife, and walking up to the prisoner, immediately cut the cords with which he was bound, and set him free, who with his deliverer, had scarcely sufficient time to get away, before the shell burst: Thus at the risk of his own life, did he preserve a culprit that otherwise inevitably must have perished, from his inability at the moment to extricate himself.

On Friday and Saturday last night arrived at Aberdeen, the first two divisions of the Princess Charlotte of Wales' or M'Leod Fencibles, on their way for this country.

Tuesday evening Major Sirr apprehended the following persons charged with being the robbers and murderers of the late Mr. Duff, and with almost all the robberies lately committed in the city; they have been identified and committed to prison. A number of the articles (watches, bank notes, plate, the pistols of Mr. Duff, &c.) found upon them, have been recognized, and remain in the Major's possession:—James Reynolds, John Quigley, John Carney, Laurence Lynch, Lau. Harman, Patrick Hofer, Denis Mooney.

One of these fellows was taken in a gambling-house near the Castle Gate, where he with several other ruffians were playing hazard. It is with regret we mention that some gentlemen of character were degraded enough to be found in such a place with such company.

If the determination of the Magistrates to prosecute the owner of this house be carried into effect, it will put an end to one of the ways in which ruffians now dispose of the property obtained by robbery and murder.

An attempt was made by a gang of villains, on Sunday night last, to get entrance into the house of Mr. Wilson, of High-street, with a view, no doubt, to plunder it, by rapping at the hall-door, and when asked from within, 'who was there?' a villain without replied, that Mr. W. had fallen in the street, near his house, and was unable to get home. The servant within knowing this to be a falsehood, said he would not open the door; the fellow finding this stratagem not succeed, then said he had some papers for Mr. W. to deliver, and desired the servant to open the door and receive them. The latter still adhered closely to caution, and would not do so, desiring the fellow to put any paper he had under the door; the ruffian accordingly put in some papers that way, expecting that the servant would then be off his guard, and comply; but on examining them, they were found to be deceptions made up for the purpose, and the efforts of the villains failed. The caution of the servant deserves great applause—for it appears there was a large gang of these fellows lurking about the door, watching to get entrance by these stratagems into the house. Upon no account should a servant open a hall-door at night, to a rap, without knowing well to whom.

A noted offender, named Gaven, who was sent out of the Country for malpractices, but returned, and is charged with being a leader of

Extract of a letter from an Officer in the 49th Regiment to his friend in this city, dated Heaxelbourg, 24th Sept.

"On the 19th we marched 18 miles to Hoorn 10,000 strong, without the smallest opposition, which town we took possession of, and were received by the inhabitants with great joy. The Tree of Liberty planted in the centre of the town, was immediately cut down by the people, and burnt. In the evening hearing our troops retired on the right to gain a former position, we judged it right to do so too. Our battalion is now on the right of the line, and we expect to be engaged in a day or two, when from the great spirit and alacrity of our troops, I hope in the event to be able to give you a good account of the enemy.—General Hutchinson is here with the army, and so is his brother Mr. Christopher Hutchinson, a volunteer. They are both in excellent health and spirits."
