We are sorry to learn of the stoppage yester-  
day of two more Commercial Houses in this City.

None of the Hamburgh Mails, of which three  
are now due, had arrived when this Paper (*Star*)  
was put to press; but by a Cartel arrived at  
Dover, which sailed from Calais so long ago as  
Monday morning last, we have received the *Cou-  
rier de l'Europe* of the 12th Vendemiaire (the 4th  
instant) from which we extract the following ar-  
ticles, which are the only ones worth noticing.

BRUSSELS, 9 Vendemiaire, Oct. 1.

We have to day received no direct news from  
Holland, as the ordinary courier will not arrive  
till to-morrow. We, however, learn by private  
information, that the English have begun to  
bombard the town of Staveren in Friesland, near  
the Zuyder Zee. The enemy are going to make  
a diversion by land, while a considerable flotilla  
will threaten Amsterdam on the side towards the  
sea. They will then take advantage of the mo-  
ment when the French and Batavian troops are  
occupied in different points to make a general  
attack on the army of General Brune. In con-  
sequence of this intelligence every exertion is  
employed to hasten the progress of the intended  
reinforcements. Orders have been given that  
the troops shall march without intermission, and  
to transport them to the place of their destina-  
tion in carriages.

We are informed that on the 5th, September  
27, there was a bloody engagement between the  
French and British cavalry, in the neighbour-  
hood of St. Martin, which terminated without  
any advantage to either party.

PARIS, 11 Vendemiaire, Oct. 3.  
The Court of Spain has just given orders for  
a great number of troops, and particularly ca-  
valry, to file off towards Ultramar, as it is  
supposed that the English and Portuguese are  
meditating an attack in that quarter.

12 Vendemiaire, Oct. 4.  
Yesterday morning 450 troops of the line dis-  
covered a column of Chouans at the distance of  
two leagues from Segee, and immediately attack-  
ed them, and after a brisk fire of musquetry,  
repulsed them.

The Prussian Gazettes, in an official article,  
announced, that these preparations had no other  
object than to protect the tranquillity of the fron-  
tiers of the kingdom on the side of Holland, and  
to ensure more and more the neutrality of the  
States of the north of Germany, which live un-  
der the protection of the Cabinet of Berlin; for  
that purpose there will be formed an army of  
40,000 men between the Weser and the Rhine.

From the right bank of the Rhine we learn  
that the hussars of Szeckler have carried off a  
whole post, consisting of 60 men, the greater  
part dragoons, beyond the Lahn. Nine regiments  
of infantry, and two of cavalry are taking a po-  
sition above the fortrefs of Ehrenbreitstein; these  
troops are descending the Upper Rhine. About  
one thousand Russians, taken prisoners in North  
Holland, arrived this afternoon in this commune,  
and lodgings have been prepared for them; they  
will continue their march to Paris the day after  
to-morrow. These prisoners are escorted by  
large bodies of troops, and they are considered  
here as animals of a rare species. The Russian  
General Hermann arrived here the day before  
yesterday.

it in the Duke of York's dispatches, that we  
have taken Saardam, the grand dock-yard of  
Holland, and that Admiral Mitchell has advan-  
ced with his flotilla to the bombardment of  
Hoorne. Much have been said of an attack upon  
Amsterdam from the Zuyder Zee, and it is sup-  
posed that that city would immediately surren-  
der, if the vessels which defend the entrance of  
the Pampus were destroyed. But those who in-  
dulge the supposition forget that there are but 8  
or 9 feet water in the Pampus, and that no vessel  
of any force could sail through it.—gun-boats,  
indeed, might be employed.—But, if Amsterdam  
is taken, it will in all probability be from the  
land side.

Saardam, in North Holland, which after the  
battle of Alkmaar must have fallen into the pos-  
session of the allied army, is a great acquisition,  
being one of the first magazines of ship timber  
and naval stores in Europe. It has no less than  
300 windmills! Some of these are sawing mills,  
which cut 50 boards at once; others are chiefly  
oil mills, paper mills, and mills for cutting to-  
bacco. There are 200 bridges across the canals  
at Saardam.

The yellow fever has again made its appear-  
ance in Philadelphia, as is stated in the following  
extract of a letter from a Merchant in Baltimore,  
dated the 30th of August to a gentleman now re-  
sident in this city:—"Baltimore continues re-  
markably healthy; but Philadelphia is now, and  
has for some time past, being grievously afflicted  
with their old fatal fever, in consequence of  
which, all the banks and public offices are shut.  
Every person who can move has left the place,  
and it is said the city is nearly deserted.
