None of the Hamburgh Mails, of which three are now due, had arrived when this Paper (Star) was put to prefs; but by a Cartel arrived at Dover, which failed from Calais To long ago as Monday morning last, we have received the Courier de l'Europe of the 12th Vendemiare (the 4th instant) from which we extract the following articles, which are the only ones worth noticing. She brought no other Journals:

BRUSSELS, 9 Vendemiaire, Oct. 1.

We have to day received no direct news from Holland, as the ordinary courier will not arrive till to-morrow. We, however, learn by private information, that the English have begun to bombard the town of Staveren in Friesland, near the Zuyder Zee. The enemy are going to make a diversion by land, while a considerable flotilla will threaten Amsterdam on the side towards the fea. They will then take advantage of the moment when the French and Batavian troops are occupied in different points to make a general attack on the army of General Brune. In consequence of this intelligence every exertion is employed to haften the progress of the intended reinforcements. Orders have been given that the troops shall march without intermission, and to transport them to the place of their destination in carriages.

We are informed that on the 5th, September 27. there was a bloody engagement between the French and British cavalry, in the neighbourhood of Sr. Martin, which terminated without

any advantage to either party.

The Court of Spain has just given orders for a great number of troops, and particularly cavalry, to file off towards Ellramadura, as it is supposed that the English and Portuguese are meditating an attack in that quarter.

12 Vendemiaire, Oct. 4.

Yesterday morning 450 troops of the line difcovered a column of Chouans at the distance of two leagues from Segee, and immediately attacked them, and after a brilk fire of mulquetry, repulled them.

The Pruffian Gazettes, in an official article, announced, that these preparations had no other object than to protect the tranquillity of the frontiers of the kingdom on the fide of Holland, and to enfure more and more the neutrality of the States of the north of Germany, which live under the protection of the Cabinet of Berling for that purpose there will be formed an army of 40,000 men between the Weler and the Rhine.

From the right bank of the Rhine we learn that the huffars of Szeckler have carried off a whole post, consisting of 60 men, the greater part drigoons, beyond the Lahn. Nine regiments of infantry, and two of cavalry are taking a pofition above the fortrels of Ehrenbreitlein; thefe troops are defeending the Upper Rhine. About one shouland Ruffiens, taken prisoners in North Holland, arrived this afternoon in this commune, and lodgings have been prepared for them; they will continue their march to Paris the day after to-morrow. These prisoners are escorted by large bodies of troop, and they are confidered here as animals of a rare species. The Russian General Hermann arrived here the day before J'efferday.

Saardam, in North Holland, which after the battle of Alkmaar must have fallen into the poffession of the allied army, is a great acquisition, being one of the first magazines of ship timber and naval flores in Europe. The yellow fever has again made its appearance in Philadelphia, as is stated in the following extract of a letter from a Merchant in Baltimore, dated the 30th of August to a gentleman now refident in this city :- " Baltimore continues remarkably healthy; but Philadelphia is now, and has for some time past, being grievously afflicted with their old fatal fever, in confequence of which, all the banks and public offices are shut, Every person who can move has lest the place, and it is faid the city is nearly deferted.
