

there on the 6th of September last, after a passage of 43 days.—All our accounts from that quarter, speak of his return to that country as an event the most desirable that could possibly be imagined, and which had created the most universal joy amongst all ranks and descriptions of people, as his exemplary conduct, both in public and private life, during his former residence there, had raised the highest admiration and affection for his character and person throughout the Province. Indeed, we cannot help feeling some regret that his Royal Highness has not been employed in some more active scene nearer home, at a moment like this, as his distinguished abilities and great professional knowledge most eminently qualify him for such a situation. Few Commanders ever possessed in a higher degree the talent of gaining the confidence and love of all around them; and every individual under his command is generally as much interested in his honour and success, as they are in their own, and this quality has generally rendered an officer successful at the head of British troops. His Royal Highness, from never having been engaged in any public capacity at home, is but little personally known, as yet, to the nation at large.

The *Arethusa* sailed again from Halifax, on her return to England, the 18th ult.

The Bombay army, under the command of Lieut. Gen. Stuart, marched on the 13th of May, on its return to Malabar, by the way of Coorga, to take possession of the district of Canara; it arrived at Cannanore on the 22d.

Napper Tandy's health is much impaired.—Blackwell, when the smiths (on board the vessel which was to take him to Cuzhaven) were putting on his irons, was, for the first time, to appearance, moved, and exclaimed—"O Liberty! is this the reward of thy warmest defenders?"

Malta is now blockaded by the Russians and Turks; and 3000 Russians are immediately to embark from Leghorn for that place. In the mean time, Captain Ball is on shore, being appointed Governor by the King of the two Sicilies.

Riot of the *Lascars*.—On Wednesday afternoon, about 4 o'clock, a number of men of the above description, to the amount of about 56, went, accompanied by some attorney, to the Judges' Chambers, Serjeant's Inn, to lay a complaint against their Captain for ill-treatment, and to get transferred to some other on their return to the East Indies. There being no Judge in town, and being unable to accomplish their wishes, they became refractory, and drew their knives; so that the aid of the Police, and a party of the City Militia, quartered in the Old Bailey, were called in: the Lord Mayor also attended, and very humanely expostulated, promising them every redress if they would depart peaceably; but it was not till two o'clock in the morning they left the Inn, and then were obliged to be dragged away, and lodged in the Poultry Compter.

Extract of a letter from Deal, Oct 22.

"The *Hornet* sloop of war, which arrived in the Downs yesterday morning from the Texel, left it on Friday last, and brings no other intelligence from the army, than that they still remain in their entrenchments at Schagenburg.—The day prior to the *Hornet's* sailing, two British seamen were shot by an unknown hand from a chamber window at the Helder; and on Friday morning they had commenced shipping the heavy ordnance. Admiral Mitchell has returned to the Texel, leaving a detached Squadron cruising in the Zuyder Zee.

Oct 23] His Majesty's ship *Alkmaar* has arrived in the Downs, with about 600 Dutch soldiers and Officers on board from Holland.—

after 9 o'clock at night.

On Sunday night last, a *Piquet*, consisting of a serjeant and eight men from that vigilant corps of Yeomen Cavalry, the *Owena* and *Arra* Cavalry, commanded by Capt. Richard Waller, being out on patrol, discovered near the village of *Bilboa*, a party of mounted Rebels, supposed to be then collecting for their wonted purpose of depredations; on their perceiving the *Piquet's* approach, they fled in every direction, in which they were favoured by the darkness of the night, they however left behind eight horses, which may probably lead to a discovery of the Rebel Riders.

Monday evening, eleven of the Servants and Helpers employed about Mount-Shannon, were brought in and lodged in the City Gaol, on suspicion of some or all of them being accessory to the murder of Mr. Allen, as mentioned in our last.

The Dublin City Militia is ordered to Arklow and Gorey to replace the *Sligo*, who are to occupy the present quarters of the Dublin at *Kilcullen*: the South Cork go to *Kildare* and the neighbouring cantonments; the Cork City take up the quarters of the South Cork at *Enniscorthy*.

The *Clare* Militia have not yet marched from *Balinglass*; but a letter received this morning from the Commanding Officer, mentions their daily expecting orders to proceed for this city.

This morning, the First Division of the Royal Meath Militia marched into this city from *Cork*, and are to proceed on Friday for *Castlebar*.
