

His Royal Highness the Duke of York transacted business yesterday at his office, in the Horse Guards.

The day after the battle of Alkmaar, his Royal Highness the Duke of York, who had taken no sleep the preceding night, sat down upon the rising bank of a windmill to rest himself. He soon saw a soldier with a piece of provision in his hand, the smell of which had reached him.—The Duke bid one of his attendants to see what the soldier had.—The latter came, and it was a goose, about three parts plucked, and roasted at a camp fire. The Duke asked him if he could spare a bit? The man immediately proceeded to make apologies about the bad dressing. The Duke replied, "Prithee, soldier, don't make compliments to an hungry stomach," and he began eating heartily, with a biscuit for his plate; some of the other Commanders eat a bit also. The private ran back for some drink, and brought a firkin of gin. After the relish was finished, the Duke took a pull out of the firkin's mouth; the other officers also drank.—"I hope, soldier, I have not spoiled your dinner?"—"No, Sir, my five comrades in the mess are now eating another goose." "Then," said the Duke, "take a lous for yourself, and five others for your comrades."

DUBLIN,—Nov. 11.

The report of an intended pacific negociation being opened at Berlin, under the direction of Mr. Grenville, was again revived on the Royal Exchange, in London, on Tuesday last. No particulars, however, were mentioned.

The Parliament of this Kingdom, which stood prorogued to Tuesday the 12th inst. is further prorogued to Tuesday the 3d day of December next.

Twenty cargoes of wheat from Sicily are expected to arrive in London before the end of the present month.

Waterford, Nov. 9. Yesterday a division of the Pembrokehire Militia marched in here, in order to embark for England.—The remainder is to arrive here this day.

A detachment from the 54th regiment consisting of about 20 private, &c. also marched in here yesterday.—They, with parties, from some other regiments, are to be embarked on board transports, which are to convey to the West Indies some of the United Irishmen at New Geneva.

Monday last, the Lord Lieutenant and Council of Ireland, issued a Proclamation, prohibiting the exportation of all manner of Corn or Grain, ground or unground, meal, malt, flour, bread, biscuit, starch, and hair powder, out of all, or any Ports of this Kingdom, until the 29th day of September next, save only such quantities as shall be necessary for the Shipping which shall go out of this Kingdom, for provisions for the ship's crew;—they have likewise prohibited the making, selling, or offering to sale, of any bread within this kingdom, whether under the title of bread, cakes, rolls, or muffins, or of any other denomination, of a finer quality, or higher price, or of a lower affize, than common Household Bread, until further order.—And has at the same time offered a bounty of 10s. per quarter for

Major Uniacke having had information of unlawful assemblies in the County of Clare, went out last Sunday night with a party of the military, and brought in thirty-four prisoners, who, we understand, are to be tried under the Insurrection Act.

Monday and yesterday, two divisions of the Clare Regiment of Militia, commanded by Col. Burton, marched into this City from Baltinglass, to do duty until further orders;—the remainder of the Regiment are expected to arrive in the course of this week.

Last night a Private of the Royal Lancashire Cavalry, fell into the River at the Long-dock,—he was immediately taken up, and brought to the Dispensary, where medical assistance was given, but it proved ineffectual.

This day two Companies of the South Mayo Militia, under the command of Capt. Fitzmaurice, marched into this City, on their route for Sligo.
