A great difficulty, it is mentioned, by this decision arises to the Collector of Wexford, with whom the sum awarded was lodged, and paid as decreed by the magistrates; how he will get back the money paid, which has been disallowed, is to him a serious consideration. [1810.]

The citizens of Dublin and public in general, must be highly indebted to the humane and unremitted exertions of Mr. Commissioner Annesley, in successfully detecting the undue export of bread corn; as also in pointing out such distilleries as use oats and corn prohibited by law. Since, no doubt, various frauds and impositions will be attempted, in order to baffle the good effects of the Proclamation, and render it subservient to the monopoly and speculation of those who so much contributed to the present dearth, it is the more laudable in Mr. Annesley to persevere in not only maintaining a just execution of the present salutary order of Government, but on behalf of the suffering public, to oblige revenue officers to observe necessary vigilance, in bringing to justice such daring violators of the law.
