In the Limerick Mail Coach which went hence on Friday morning for Dublin, there were four passengers, James Molony, Esq; Mr. Sandes, Mr. Greene, and Miss Rolleston, of Dunkerrin; —unfortunately the military guard does not attend the Coach until its arrival at Monastereven, so that at this season of the year, it travels about five hours at night: —the robbery committed on Friday night last, was near Ballybrittas; besides raking the mail, the robbers entirely plundered the passengers.

Extract of a Letter from Dublin, Nov. 18.

"Yesterday evening Napper Tandy, H. M. Morris, and their associates, were brought up from the Packet, escorted by a strong military guard. Such was the curiosity of the populace to see them, that crowds were pursuing the carriages in every direction. Various opinions are formed of NAPPER'S future fate: some assert that apartments are fitting up for him in the genteel manner in Kilmainham, while others assert that a Gibbet is making for his more conspicuous reception!"
