

the septenary division, he must be terrible, will be taken as a great boon by the majority of the people, and beget a degree of attachment to his measures in the breasts of millions of the French, which cannot but be highly serviceable to his views. The re-establishing Sunday as a day of rest instead of Decady, will give him a hold of the minds of men that cannot fail to keep up the ranks of his army. To insist on the reasons that lead to this opinion, would be paying an ill compliment to the discernment of our readers.— They must stare every man in the face, who, in attending to the dispositions of mankind in general, have studied the characters of Buonaparte and Sieyes in particular. Time will probably confirm the justness of the above observations, as it has already the correctness of the reasoning that made us, when even standing alone in our opinion, predict the overthrow of the late tyrannical Government which has only met with the fate it merited.

The *Hamburgh Mail*, due on Sunday last, arrived this morning.

The *Vienna Court Gazette* of the 2d inst. only contains, under the head of War Occurrences, the farther details, from General Melas, of the affair of the 19th and 20th October, in which the French were driven to their mountainous position, as stated in a former Gazette. It only adds that the loss of the French, in killed and wounded, was considerable, and that 3 officers, and 100 privates, with a piece of ordnance, fell into the hands of the Austrians, who had but few men killed and not more than 60 wounded. The French appear to be too weak in that quarter, and on the side of Piedmont, to venture a general attack; but they endeavour, by frequent marching and counter-marching, and by harassing the advanced posts, to embarrass the Austrians, and keep their whole corps on the alert.

The Official reports from the Archduke only come down to the 25th of October. They mention that the communication with Philipburgh had been restored on the 22d of October. However, advices from Callsruhe, of the 28th, state, that Philipburgh is entirely enclosed again, and is undergoing a siege in form. The head quarters of the French army of the Rhine were at Bruschal on the second inst. An article from Frankfurt, dated the 5th, states that the French are already at Callsruhe.

The latest accounts from Italy are of the 28th and 29th of October. The head-quarters of General Melas were at Montenera, seven leagues from Coni, and his advanced posts were within three leagues of that fortress. His army consists of between 50,000 and 60,000 men. General Bellegarde is on the Genoese borders, with ten thousand men.

A corps of Austrian troops were advancing from Leghorn, to reinforce General Klenau in the Genese, and 3,300 Russians were embarked at Leghorn, on the 17th October, on a secret expedition, probably to act against Genoa in conjunction with the corps under General Klenau.

On the 24th October, a column of 12,000 French penetrated from Novi, in order to advance towards Coni, to relieve that fortress.— The Imperial troops under General Karaiczai made a most obstinate defence, but were at length forced to retreat. The French seemed determined to raise the siege of Coni, *coute que conte*.

The Grand Duke Constance and Prince Marshal Suwarrow arrived at Memmingen on the 2d, with the General Staff of the Russian army.

The Prince of Conde, with his corps, had passed the same day thro' that town on his way to Landsbergh.

Great part of the Russian troops have marched through Memmingen, on their way to the envi-
