A Gentleman in the neighbourhood of Bath, whose Potatoes were a considerable time under water, says, that by spreading them in a dry place, and daily turning them, they became perfectly dry; they afterwards dressed as mealy as though they had not been under water at all.—A hint well worthy the attention of the public.

Last Monday evening, Lieut. Colonel Maffly, son to the veteran General Maffly, who had volunteered on the expedition against Holland, arrived in Cork;—he was attached to the 35th Regiment, and is one of the few Officers of that gallant Regiment who escaped being either killed or wounded.

Extract from a Pamphlet lately published, and entitled 'Impartial Relation of the Military operations which took place in Ireland, in consequence of the landing of a body of French troops under General Humbert, in August, 1798.' by an Officer\* who served in the Corps, under the command of his Excellency Marquis Cornwallis.

Colonel Vereker having received information that a detachment of the enemy was at Coloony, and intended from thence to march round by Drumchare, to support the attack to be made upon Sligo, by Ballifodare, and under the impression that the main body of the enemy had remained in Castlebar, marched from Sligo with about 270 men of the Limerick City Militia, 30 of the 24th Dragoons, and two Curriole guns, which, from the information he had received, he thought a force equal to the attack of the enemy. The engagement took place about a quarter of a mile to the northward of Coloony, and was warmly maintained for the space of an hour, when the French, by their great superiority of numbers, were enabled to outflank, and to force Colonel Vereker's right, and obliged him to retreat. The Officers and men of the Limerick City Regiment, behaved most gallantly in the action, and suffered considerably. Captain Crips, their Adjutant, was killed †—Colonel Vereker, Lieut. Colonel, the Major, and two Subalterns ‡ were wounded; two Captains and two Subalterns taken prisoners. Had the enemy been opposed with equal firmness by some of the corps at Castlebar, he would probably never have reached Coloony."
