LIMERICK,—DECEMBER 11.

A General Court Martial is to be assembled on Monday next, of which General Sir James Duff, Bart. is to be President, for the trial of the Col. and Major of the Glangarry Fencible Regiment.

Mooney, Dornan, Gore, and Malone, four of the robbers who stopped and pillaged the post from Philipstown to Dublin last month, were sentenced by a Court-Martial, on Tuesday se'night, to be hanged.

Two of the robbers who attacked the Mail-Coach from hence to Dublin near Monastereven, as lately mentioned, were pursued and shot by a patrol of the Castle Dermot Yeomanry; and one of the same gang, a notorious offender, of the name of Doyle, was shot by a patrol of Captain Saunders's Yeomanry in the County of Wicklow; one taken prisoner by the Kilcullen Yeomanry, and another has surrendered himself to General Dundas; another of the gang, (whose name is Dwyer) known to have been dreadfully wounded in his belly, remains as yet concealed. The above delinquents were brought to justice in consequence of one of their associates turning approver.

On Monday night last, a number of men, armed with guns and pistols, broke into the mills at Abington, in this County, in which was a servant of Mr. Keys, the owner, whom they threatened with destruction, after which they robbed the mills of Frize and Blankets to the value of above 40l.
