

Clonmel, Dec. 14. On the night of the 8th inst. 14 sheep were destroyed on the lands of Henry Briscoe, Esq; at Tinivane, by persons as yet unknown—A reward of fifty pounds is offered by Mr. Briscoe for the discovery of the perpetrators of this brutal act.

Tuesday last, eleven prisoners (six of whom belonged to Baron Hompesche's corps) were brought into Waterford from Kilkenny, and the next day they were taken to New Geneva, from whence to be sent to the West Indies, to serve in His Majesty's army.
