operations of the Austrian army under General Melas, to the 14th ult, which is the time to which the French accounts brought down the detail of events in that quarter; but as the French confessed themselves to have been worsted, of course we have been looking for the present accounts to inform us of what the French ones would avoid stating. General Melas's report is dated Head-quarters at Morozzo, November 14.

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Mondovi has been taken, and the French were repulsed as far as Col di Tenda, which place was expected to be immediately occupied by the Austrians. General Sommeriva having fent a detachment which drove the French from the post of the barricades, the Officer commanding that expedition took post at Argentera, from whence he fent a strong patrolling party even on the French territory. General Bellegarde was following up the French in their retreat.

Letters of a later date state, that General Melas had advanced his head quarters as far as Centale. The fiege of Coni is advancing rapidly : great quantities of heavy artillery have arrived at that place. The French fince their late defeats in Italy, have made no farther attempts to advance from Acqui.

Accounts from Rome, of the 19th ult. mention that the Russians who had arrived in that city had proceeded from thence to Naples, where tranquility is faid to be at length re established. Cardinal Ruffo is gone to Venice to be prefent at the Conclave.

The Vienna Court Gazette faye, that no official accounts had yet been received at Constantinople of any engagement having taken place between the French and Turkith armies on the frontiers of Egypt.

Two French officers, with a fleg of truce, have lately passed through Constance, with dispatches from General Massena, for Vienna.

The Austrian troops in the North of Suabia, having been confiderably reinforced, are preparing to relieve Philipsburgh.

Marshal Suwarrow's army was to proceed, on the 25th of November, from Aughburgh on its way to Bavaria; the first day's murch was to be to Eiraifburgh a distance, of eighteen miles --One part of the troops are to march through Bohemia to Cracow, and another thro' Moravia into Gallicia. It was however, reported, that Prince Ferdinand would command 30,000 Ruffians, under the Archdude.

It is with great pleasure we announce that a confiderable supply of foreign wheat has already arrived, or will foon arrive, in this country, which must no doubt have a beneficial effect in reducing the price of bread. On Thursday morning last the thip Speculator, of Elbing, Peter Francs master, entered at the Custom-bouse of Cowes 2000 quarters of prime wheat, and from the master's report it appears, that upwards of 40 fail of thips were at Dantzick and Pillau, when he failed about three weeks ago, all laden with corn for different paris of England.

Letters, which have been received by various persons of the first confideration among the French Emigrant Nobility, and by other persons of not less responsibility, agree in the general statement of a rumour which had its origin in the Triumvirate at the Luxembourg. It is generally reported, upon this authority, fay thefe letters, that the unfortunate Louis XVII. fupposed to have expired in the Temple, upon the 9th of June, 1795, is still alive. The Triumvir Syeves is affigued both as the author of the report, and the evidence of the fact. It was he who is faid to have subtracted the devoted Prince from the poilons of the National Convention .-He procured a child of a corresponding age, from the Hospital of the Hotel Dieu, incurably affected with the Scrafula, the pretended difeafe of the young King; and admitted this unfortunate child into the Temple, and exposed the body, disfigured with ulcers and operations, inflead of the Royal victim According to this relation, Louis XVII. exists.
