THE Roman Catholics of this City, having in conjunction with their Protestant Brethren, already expressed in the fullest and most unequivocal terms, their Disapprobation of a Legislative UNION with Great Britain, would not deem a separate avowal of their sentiments necessary, had they not seen with equal surprize and concern, an Address affixing to convey their Opinions upon that important Subject.

Resolved, That the said Address has been formed without our concurrence, presented without our knowledge, and was expressive merely of the opinions of a partial and induced number of our Community.

Resolved, That though we entertain the most inviolable attachment to our Beloved Sovereign, and the most profound respect for the Administration of the Marquis Cornwallis, we cannot withhold expressing our immovable Dislike to a Measure fraught with Ruin and Degradation to a Country, which, since the glorious epoch of 1782, has been rapidly improving in Commerce, Manufactures, Industry, and Population.

Resolved, That the warmest expressions of our gratitude, be tendered to the Illustrious and Virtuous SENATORS, who have with unshaken firmness, supported the Rights and Immunities of their Country.
