A Gentleman who arrived last night in the Mail, informs us, that when the Coach left Dublin on Thursday morning, the House of Commons were in full debate on the important question of the Union; that no strangers were admitted into the House, and that at that early hour, the populace were in crowds in College-Green. — A number of English troops arrived in Dublin on Wednesday last.

Wednesday night, five men and a woman, were brought in and lodged in the County Gaol, by Lieut. C. D. Oliver, and an escort of the Kilbane Cavalry — they are charged with forging small Limerick Bank Notes, several of which were found in their custody.

On Thursday, was committed to the County Gaol by Robert H. Morgan, Esq; and a party of the Newbridge Cavalry. John O'Neil, taken at Bruce, in this County, charged on oath with having uttered and passed several forged bank post-bills of the Bank of Berensford, and Co. and also forged notes of the Limerick Bank.
