

Legislature was merely colonial, when it only introduced heads of a bill, yet nobody ever questioned the acts so passed—could Noble Lords therefore question the power of Parliament to incorporate with the British Legislature.

At Aft-paft Three this morning, (feveral other Lords having fpoke) the Houfe divided, and the Address was carried by a Majority of 49.

Mr. Prime Serjeant laid there was an order of the Houfe for the attendance of the High Sheriff of the King's County, and Major Rogers, the military commandant at Berr, to attend the Bar of the Houfe to-morrow, to answer in a matter of privilege, upon complaint of an Hon. Bifhop. Thofe Gentlemen, he underftood, were both arrived in town, ready to meet examination. The fuppoſing their attendance till to-morrow would only ſerve to interrupt an important debate. If Gentlemen on the other fide were ready to bring forward the queſtion, he, and the Gentlemen on the other fide, were alfo ready, and he ſhould move they attend to-morrow.

Mr. Plunket rofe, and, with ſome warmth, expreſſed his abhorrence at the language of the Right Hon. Gentleman, in ſpeaking of a readineſs of that fide of the Houfe, as if a matter, in which the privileges and the conſtitutional rights of the fubject were at ſſue, were to be conſidered a queſtion of party.—Did the Right Hon. Gentleman and his Friends mean to inſult, that they had prejudged the buſineſs before they had heard any evidence in the caſe, or had they made up their minds and predetermined, in all events, to ſcreen the parties accuſed? For his own part, he knew of no object any honeſt or fair Member of Parliament could have on this queſtion, but to bring the accuſed parties to their trial, and impartially to investigate the evidence on both ſides. If it ſhould appear they were guilty, let them be puniſhed and made public examples, in order to let them, and the people at large, know, that the privileges of Parliament, or the conſtitutional rights of the people of Ireland, were not to be violated with impunity, or ſuch a violation ſcreened by any influence or reſpect of perſons. If not guilty, let them be vindicated from the charge and acquitted.

Mr. Prime Serjeant laid, he had made up his mind, for he had heard the ſtory of thoſe Gentlemen, and he could venture to ſwore the Houfe, that the charge againſt them would run out to be a grofs miſtake, and calculated to excite irritation without doing upon the queſtion of Law.

Sir Laurence Parſons denied the truth of a charge fo extraordinary, and ſaid that what he had alledged he would ſubſtantiate by evidence at the proper time.

The Marquis of Downſhire has been ſuſpended from the command of his Regiment, the Royal Downſhire Militia, until his Majesty's pleaſure ſhall be further known.

Tueſday in the Houfe of Commons, Mr. G. Poynton moved to know if it was the intention of the noble Lord Chancellor to go into the conſideration of his Excellency's Message on to-morrow evening—if it was, it would be burying that Houfe into ſuch a conſideration, without having had time for due information on the ſubject. The noble Lord had no former night expreſſed his reſolution to preſentiate the buſineſs, and he hoped he would not upon that ſentiment.—Lord Callaghan ſaid, that it was not his deſire to bring forward the order ſending for the noble Lord Chancellor, but he was ſure that if he had ſuch a queſtion to be made in the Houſe, he had therefore no objection to accommodate Gentlemen by agreeing to fix the order for Friday.—Here a delibatory converſation took place, in the courſe of which Mr. Dawſon moved, that the order be poſtopped to Monday—this was negatived, and the motion for Friday being put, a diviſion took place, when the Members being equal—47 ayes and 47 noes, the Chair decided for Friday, in favour to the order, which the longſt period of poſtopment was accordingly negatived.—The Houſe adjourned to 10 o'clock.
