

insoluble burden in the country. Mr. O'Donel after some further matter voted for Mr. Annelley's quitting the chair.

The question having been put on Col. Barry's motion, the House divided.

Aves 108—Noes 150—Majority 42.  
Tellers for the Ayes, Col. Barry.  
For the Noes Mr. Johnson.

The Original Motion was then put and carried. Lord CASTLEREAGH then moved another resolution of the same provision.

Mr. J. C. BERESFORD proposed an amendment, on which

Mr. PLUNKET expressed his dissent to any amendment. A motion had been offered to the country, and he would not concur in rendering it palatable to the victim. After professing that the Financial Terms were but a base money offered as equivalent to valuable consideration, he adjured the Minister to consider the awful and critical time in which he wished to press forward such a Measure—a moment in which perhaps the fate of England and Ireland depended on circumstances not in the power of any man to calculate; when perhaps a formidable invasion was concerting—he besought then the Noble Lord to refrain from carrying the measure against the ascertained sense of the country—he was sure all sides of the House agreed in an ardent feeling of loyalty, let not then the Minister weaken or destroy that feeling on one side of the House, but withdraw a measure that would leave the gentlemen of Ireland a Constitution to fight for, and then no effort of a Foreign foe could make an impression on the country.

The amendment was negatived without a Division, and the original motion carried.

Lord CASTLEREAGH then moved the several other resolutions of the proposition, all of which passed without opposition.

The House having resumed, Mr. Annelley reported progress, and obtained leave to sit again on Wednesday, on which day Lord Castlereagh gave notice that he would move the Commercial Propositions.

Col. COPE complained to the House of a gross misrepresentation of a late debate in a Newspaper called the Anti-Union Evening Post, and moved that John Shee, the Printer of that Paper should forthwith attend at the Bar.

Mr. DAWSON who had been represented in this Newspaper as reflecting upon Col. Cope, disclaimed having in the most remote degree uttered the expressions imputed to him.

Col. COPE said he had no kind of ill-will towards the miserable Printer, who was but the tool of other persons; but as the expressions imputed to the Hon. Gentleman were obviously contrived in order to do him (Col. Cope) injury in the County of Armagh, he would persevere in his motion. The order was made accordingly.

John Shea attended at the Bar, was asked whether he had printed the Anti-Union Newspaper, containing the misrepresentation complained of.—He confessed that he had printed the Paper, and expressed his sorrow for having misrepresented the proceedings of the House.

Col. Cope moved that John Shea should be discharged which was done accordingly.

The House then adjourned to next day.

Tuesday, Feb. 25.

On the motion of Col. BARRY the following persons were ordered to attend the committee on the subject of Union, to-morrow evening:—Messrs Joshua Pim, Henry Sidler, Wm. Orr, D. T. O'Brien, Messrs. Mulsany and Thorne. —The object of this motion Col. Barry said, was to shew by the evidence of those informed and respectable gentlemen, that an Union on the terms proposed, would be highly injurious to the trade and manufactures of this kingdom.

The house having referred into committee on the militia volunteer bill, Mr. Alexander in the chair.—After some general observations on the parts of Colonels Barry, Wolfe, Bigwell, Lord Clements, and Lord Castre, the chairman reported progress, and then moved for the adjournment.

Advices are daily expected of the *Draft Fleet* having put to sea. A new Admiral is appointed to the command of that fleet, who has been twice a prisoner in England. The first time was on the 11th of June, when his ship was sunk, and himself and son only saved; afterwards he fought a very gallant action, and was taken by a British frigate.—The third attempt, we hope, may prove finally fatal, by either the capture of the entire fleet, or a *short Gazette* of their being totally sunk, burned, and destroyed!

On Wednesday the 12th ult. Alex. Mollison, Seward to the Right Hon. Lord Cabri, was barbarously murdered on his way from Killeconnor to Cabri, by two men at present unknown, one of whom fired a pistol at him which entered his back, and came out at his right breast, and of which wound he expired shortly after giving this account.—A Proclamation has been issued by Government, offering a reward of 200l. for the perpetrators of this horrid murder.
