House of Commons—Friday, March 28

The Speaker, attended by the House, accompanied the Chancellor and the Peers to the Castle, with the Address respecting the Union.

On their return, the Speaker reported to the House the answer of his Excellency, which was, that he would transmit this loyal and dutiful Address, to be laid before his Majesty.

Mr. O'DONNELL observed of the answer, that it was just such a one as the Address deserved.

The question was put that the answer should be entered on the journals, it was carried in the affirmative, with a number of dissenting voices, but without a division.

Previous to the House resolving into a Committee of the whole to take the title bill into consideration, Mr. Osborne expressed his entire disapprobation of the Bill, as a branch of the scheme which Mr. Pitt contrived, by the whole system of Union, to render this country subservient to his financial purposes. He would however, move for an amendment to obviate in some degree the inconveniences to which the Bill in its present form would subject the country.

The SPEAKER said that the proposed amendment could not be moved until the House had resolved itself into a Committee on the question; which being done, and Mr. Alexander appointed to the chair, a desultory conversation ensued between the Attorney General, Sir H. Cavendish, &c. on one side, who pleaded the necessity of reducing the principle of the Vote of Assent into the year 1745 into a law, in order to silence the clamours which had been industriously raised on the subject, and quiet the minds of the people; while the opposition speakers, Mr. O'Donnell, Mr. Tighe, and Sir John Macartney, united in controverting the principle, alleging that this precipitate measure was by no means calculated for the effect which the framers and advocates for the Bill affected to ascribe to it.

Mr. OSBORNE, in course, moved his promised amendment, viz. That it be an instruction to the Committee to receive a clause or clauses to limit the claims of tithes within the several parishes of the Kingdom, pulled them down.

Monday, General Sir James Duff, Bart. issued his orders, in consequence of which a General Court-Martial yesterday assembled at the New Barracks, for the trial of such Persons as may be brought before them for Rebellion, Sedition, or any crime connected therewith.

The following Members compose the General Court-Martial:—

Lieut. Colonel Atherton, Lancashire Cavalry, President. Lieut. Col. Hill, 6d Regt. Major Donnellan, 6d Capt. R. Crawford, R. I. A. Capt. T. B. Otley, Lan. Co. Capt. Mings, 6th. Capt. Roberts, 6th. Gen. Smith, Eq. Recorder of Limerick, Judge Advocate.

The Court being sworn, immediately proceeded to the trial of Henry Stokes and Paul Slattery, upon the following charge:—That they on the night of the 7th of March last, were present at attacking and burning the House of John Boland, of Maunster, in this County, intended, and at the same time murdering the said Boland, his two Brothers, and two Sons;—The Court continued sitting until 3 o'clock, the next evening, examining witnesses for the Prosecution, and at 10 o'clock this morning resumed the trial, which being finished, Patrick Sheehan was put on his trial for the same offences.

Since our last a number of Persons, (some of whom are above the lower Clais,) have been brought in and lodged in our County Gaol, who will be brought to trial before the General Court-Martial.

We feel it our duty to point out to the great number of deluded Wretches in this County, that the crimes have (as before) called upon the Government to stretch out its strong arm of Justice, immediately to avail themselves of the only opportunity they can have of Mercy, by coming forward directly to the General of this District, with that information that may show their repentance of the horrid deeds they have been concerned in the perpetration of;—a voluntary confession will have a much greater claim to Mercy, than any that may and must be enforced by exemplary corporal punishment.
