 wretched Culprits confessed the horrid deed, yet
 it lasted for more than four hours, when the
 Jury after retiring for 2 minutes, found them
 all Guilty.—Sentence of Death was directly pas-
 sed on the Murderers, who are to be executed
 on Monday next, at the usual place of execution.
