

This morning arrived the Hamburg mail due yesterday. It brings no news respecting the opening of the campaign on the Rhine; but a number of reports respecting affairs in Italy—nothing official, however, except the Vienna Court Gazette, and Supplements of the 21st ult, which do not bring the accounts down later than the battle of the 10th, of which we have already had details in the London Gazette.

9. This day we received by express the Paris Journals up to the 6th instant inclusive; and never were we more disappointed than in finding them, at a moment like the present, almost void of intelligence respecting affairs in Italy. This circumstance is the more surprising as the official letters of the French Generals Suchet and Oudinot, of the 27th ult. were meant to be understood as partial details of events of which the full accounts were to be transmitted by Massena himself.

An article inserted in one of the French papers says,—That the Army of the Rhine on the 4th of May, repulsed the Austrians; it took possession of the important post of Stockach and all the borders of the Lake of Constance, made 7000 prisoners, and took 9 pieces of cannon.

DUBLIN.—MAY 12.

The fate of Mr. Lidwell, cast for death at the late assizes for Naas, is still in suspense—a powerful interest is working to save him, but though his friends have great hopes of preventing his ignominious death, if a farther respite does not take place, he will be executed on Wednesday next.

Yesterday morning, a meeting took place, on Drumcondra road, between James Corry, Esq; of Lurgan Street, and James Newburgh, Esq; in consequence of a dispute, and as alleged, the provocation of a blow given by the latter to the former.

The latter gentleman was accompanied on the ground by Captain Warring of the 24th dragoons, as his second—the other by ——— Weir, Esq; one of the attorneys. Having taken their ground, the signal was given to fire; Mr. C's pistol went off without effect; Mr. N's missed fire he was preparing to fire it afterwards, when his second called to Mr. N. telling him the fuss in duelling was considered as a fire. Both Gentlemen then were provided with other pistols, and got the signal to fire again, which they did, and Mr. N. was shot through the breast, and expired.

Extract of a letter from Dublin, May 12. The House of Commons met this evening at 4 o'clock.—Lord Castlereagh after presenting to the House a Message from his Majesty respecting the Union, moved that the Bill as altered in the British Parliament, should be taken into consideration on Wednesday next; this was very warmly opposed by Mr. O'Donnell, Colonel Fitz Gerald, and Mr. Dobby, and was zealously supported by the Attorney General, Mr. Corry, and Sir John Esquierre, when on the question being put Lord Castlereagh's motion was carried—145 for the measure of the Union—against it 80. At seven o'clock the House adjourned to Tuesday.

I have just learned from good authority, that Mr. Lidwell has been respited without a day being mentioned, but his friends are confident that he will be pardoned.—Strange as it may appear, they just know as much about him in the small town of Nias where he is confined, as you do in Limerick.
